WRECKS AROUND PHILIP ISLAND

"TIME"

In 1890 the steamer "Time" carrying coal from Griffiths Point (now San Remo) was wrecked on a sand bank eastwards from Cows. The boat became a complete wreck and much of the cargo was washed ashore. It supplied the nieghbourhood with coal for years and although 74 years have passed, small quantities can still be found on the beach after a storm. The Rule of the Island Blacksmith - Mr. Duncan McGregor, near the Pyramid - was in those days that each customer had to bring his own coal.

DID YOU KNOW? CARBON DIOXIDE

The rate and depth of respiration of the body is controlled by a nerve centre known as the RESPIRATORY CENTRE. It is sensitive to varying concentration of carbon dioxide in the blood. As soon as we start violent exercise of any muscles, carbon dioxide begins to build up and the Respiratory Centre automatically increases the depth and rate of breathing to get rid of this excess and so we start panting. In other words we have increased the ventilation of our lungs and at the same time we are taking in more oxygen to burn. A man who is fit does not pant so early or so hard as an unfit one because his blood circulation is more efficient. If the carbon dioxide is abnormally low the respiratory centre is not excited and breathing slows down or stops until the carbon dioxide has time to build up again. This presence keeps the tension of carbon dioxide in the blood and lungs at a fairly constant level.

The standard diving dress is ventilated by the air entering the helmet from the surface, and going out again through the spring loaded outlet valve. Thus the air must be supplied not only at sufficient pressure to counteract the sea pressure but in sufficient volume to sweep out the carbon dioxide as the diver produces it. This is most important to remember as the mere fact that the gauge is registering the diver's depth does not necessarily mean he is getting sufficient air to allow him to work.

In self-contained apparatus, the exhaled gases are discharged through a canister containing a chemical which absorbs the carbon dioxide and allows the purified gases to pass back into the circuit to be used again.
