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#### COVER STORY

This brilliant photograph was taken by Kleth Jensen In May 1983 when diving the U.S. Destroyer Y.P.284 off Guadalcanel, Solomon Islands. The divers from bottom to top are Alex Talay, Geoff Birtles and Steve Gardiner (dive guide), Reg Thomas dive boat can be seen on the surface. The ship lies in 120 ft. of water and was sunk on Sunday 25th October 1942 when attacked by 3 Japanese Destroyers (Akatsuki, Ikazuchi and Shiratsuyu), TECHNICAL DETAILS: Kielh used a Nikonos 3 with a 15 m/n lens. The photo was taken using natural light and Fujichrome 100 A.S.A. film.

#### EDITORIAL

With an Annual General Meeting looming in September (19/9/84) this issue has something of an administrative bias.

This year we have three committee members standing down by rotation (Goulding, Jackiw & Birtles) together with the two committee men appointed to fill casual vacancies throughout the year (Jensen and Abell). As this is just under half the entire 12 man committee it is important that as many active members as possible participate in the electoral process. All retiring committee men are offering themselves for re-election.

Paul Tipping has written an explanation on VSAG election procedure and this is followed by two nomination forms. Those standing for committee must be proposed and seconded and sign their acceptance of the nomination. This must reach VSAG's P.O. Box no later than September 5.

With an election just 4 - 5 weeks away, it is timely for those intending to nominate for committee to reflect on just how much they are prepared to put in. With over 50 organised events a year, club property, 80 members, substantial funds and a monthly newsletter, the administrative task is reasonably formidable. The club needs workers!

Traditionally the more onerous and important tasks of Secretary, Treasurer and Editor are not eagerly sought. The simple fact is that they must be done and carried out properly if the club is to remain strong and active. So spare a little thought before accepting a nomination - "Are you prepared to work?"

Whilst on this particupar subject, I should mention that this is my second last issue of Fathoms. Therefore we will need at least one capable "committee person" willing to carry out this monthly task. I firmly believe that Fathoms is a vital intra-club communication link and is (next to our members) the single most important contributor to our strength, unity and standing in the independent diving community. At this stage I know of no-one willing to undertake the task so the matter needs some heavy consideration prior to closing of nominations. Anyone willing to contemplate the task can phone me for details - and perhaps a nomination!

#### AUGUST 1984

Annual subs are now overdue, so if you wish to vote and continue to remain a member of this proudly independent club - put your money up, soon!

Included with this issue is a new member application. VSAG is anxious to update its records and it is necessary for <u>present</u> members to sign the current "Terms of Agreement" governing participation in club events and diving from member's private boats. These also include a "warranty" on medical diving eligibility. Simply cross out the word "application" on the top right hand corner of the form and substitute "update". Complete all sections and sign where indicated at foot of "Terms of Agreement". Naturally a proposer and seconder is not required nor is it necessary for <u>present</u> members to include a photocopy of SCUBA qualifications. Membership of those experienced and established present members without SCUBA certification is not affected by this "membership update".

Our President has asked me to draw members' attention to some "slack practices" creeping in on club dive events. Some of these relate to poor clubmanship, others to safety and others to sheer bad manners.

- \* If you book in for a dive turn up! (On Sunday 8/7 10 of 14 showed). A few harsh words would be said if boat owners started this practice.
- \* Boat owners should inform DC if they have personal non club guests in boat. Overloaded boats are a safety hazard and probably unnecessary, given proper planning.
- \* If, as a boat owner, you book in for a club event and have club divers on board you should remain in contact with and dive with the club. If you have no radio, stay in sight of DC. The second dive location of the day is optional, subject to consensus of your crew and signing off with DC.
- Buddies should stick together (!!!)
- Members and their visitors are expected to assist the boat owner with launch and retrieval of the boat.
- Members are expected to be on time for club dive events. A 9.30 <u>start</u> means just that. You should be geared up and leading boats at this time. An 8.30 <u>launching</u> is also self explanatory. Obviously there is slack water to catch and tardiness by boat owners or crew is unreasonable.
  - Visitors have second priority to members on club dives right up to the evening prior to the event. Do not book visitors during the preceeding week. Ask if a spot is available on the evening prior to the dive.

\* Do not book visitors for events where their experience and/or certification is obviously inappropriate.

If this issue did not reach you by the August general meeting, it is because our type setter, printer and collator could not cope with the unreasonably short lead time given them by the Editor. (Occasioned by work priorities - sorry!) If it did reach you in time it's a minor miracle and we owe these people a debt of gratitude.

#### OVERSEAS SAVINGS FUND - ON AGAIN !

#### VSAG GEARS UP FOR MID '86 by Geoff Birtles

Our last fund was an outstanding success, both for the 21 members/wives who travelled to Fiji and those who did not. Either way the fund maturity was a very welcome nest egg nicely inflated by optimal interest rates.

It is now time to start planning our next trip and getting a savings fund underway. Trip objective is <u>mid 1986</u> and the saving program kicks off at the <u>September</u> GM. Plenty of time to plan, organise and accumulate the funds - without any real hardship.

Our last fund was clearly aimed at Fiji with a holiday/family emphasis and reef diving. This time its wreck bashing - any reefs will only be incidental sightings as we swim over them on the way to rape a wreck!

Fiji taught us that non-diving wives can enjoy themselves on a diving holiday and once again it is proposed to include them in our planning if this is the desire of the group.

Vanuatu and The Coolidge probably offer good balance and the Solomons are a definite possibility. But, <u>there must be wrecks</u>, warm clear water and arrangements for non divers will not compromise this clear cut objective.

Both the Solomons and Vanautu will be more expensive than Fiji but we have more time to accumulate more funds. With the first payment scheduled for September '84 and the last in May '86 we have 21 months to accumulate a very substantial portion of a very worthwhile trip. Realistically we have to be looking at a "diver" package cost in the order of \$1,500 and a non Diver at about \$1,200 - for two full weeks. I am inclined to the view that mandatory monthly payments should be kept as low as possible so that the least possible hardship is imposed during those odd lean months. After all it shouldn't be too hard to find an extra \$200 or \$300 at time of departure, if the necessity arises. With this in mind the monthly subscription has been arbitrarily struck at \$59. 21 times \$59 = \$1,239 which with cumulative interest should nearly reach \$1,300.

Full details will be in September Fathoms. But, remember. Time passes quickly and small amounts of money diligently accumulated over a lengthy period add up to big dollars. Self indulgent dollars that can be

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spent free of guilt because they have been accumulated painlessly for a specific purpose. (Hedonism!) So be in it.

Those who can't wait for more information should refer back to our December '82 Fathoms which contained Fiji fund details. Those who were sceptical last time (and missed the trip) might also like to re-read this back issue.

For some, June '86 is too far away. A number of our lads have expressed a desire for a wreck bashing sortie <u>next</u> year ('85). With this in mind I am organising a Rabaul or Solomon Islands trip for May/June of next year. To minimise costs we need to get about ten divers. Would those interested in this short term objective please phone me as soon as possible so that I can firm up location and costs. If required, I will also organise a short term savings fund - possibly \$120/month. Phone 846 1983.

#### **VSAG PLANS EDEN WRECK SORTIE**

Notes & Observations by Keith Jenson

VSAG has again, in my opinion picked a great venue for it's Christmas Camp. Eden, half way between Sydney and Melbourne. Staying at the Fountain Caravan Park with electric power sites (oh, the luxury of it all!) but some wimps (read Birtles & Thackeray) have opted for flats; no sense of adventure at all.

Diving at Eden must be amongst the best available on the Eastern Coast of Australia; deep water, big fish, schools of tuna, kingfish and large wobbygong sharks (the Big M can testify to this!). It even has shipwrecks, or what remains after blasting by local lads.

The Empire Gladstone, a steel motor vessel of 7090 tons hit Haystack Rock off Pambula on the night of Sept. 5th, 1950 and became a total wreck. Now is a favourite with divers who visit the area.

Two other wrecks that I have heard about are a steam trawler sunk on the southern side of Mowarry Rock and a mystery submarine found in the early 1960's by abalone divers. I can remember the headlines in the Herald at the time. Reports were received that pilots from Jervis Bay found the sub on the surface at night, apparently recharging its batteries. They sank this submarine. The reports in the paper ceased abruptly, I could get no further information. A few months later I was told that the sub may have been an American sub that went missing in the area during the war.

The most famous wreck of all is the Ly-ee-moon wreck off the Green Cape which will be a must dive at Xmas. With the help of our President Des Williams I have researched it at the State Library and details follow to whet your appetite.

#### THE LY-EE-MOON ... IT'S SINKING


The Ly-ee-moon left Melbourne at noon on Saturday May 29th, 1886 under the command of captain Webber, 41 crew members, 23 adults and 3 infants as saloon passengers, 19 steerage passengers aboard and a mixed cargo bound for Sydney.

At about 9.00 pm on the Sunday the Captain was called to the Bridge by the third officer, Mr. Fotheringham. Capt. Webber saw breakers on the starboard bow, rushed to the wheelhouse and ordered "Hard port the helm", then went onto the deck. The light at Green Cape shining brightly and dangerously near, he then rushed to the bridge to stop the engines but this had already been done by the third officer while the Captain was in the wheelhouse.

The ship struck heavily on the reef, she struck on a ledge of the outer rock abreast of the Cape. She broke in half in about 10 minutes, the aft section remained on the reef, the forepart drifted northwards and then towards the shore where it now lies.

The saloon was in the forward section and only a steward who climbed through a porthole was saved from this part of the wreck. The after part of the ship with the engineers, firemen and all the steerage passengers stuck on the reef until the seas broke it up, until only the main mast stood above the surges to mark the grave of the Ly-ee-moon. At last the top mast toppled and formed a slender bridge with the shore, and the boatswain and three sailors managed to cross to safety.

By morning the ship had disappeared leaving wreckage and bodies floating in the surf. Only sixteen people survived the wreck. At a small cemetary near the lighthouse 24 victims of the wreck are buried, a grim reminder of the wreck of the Ly-ee-moon.



#### THE LY-EE-MOON - IT'S CONSTRUCTION

The Ly-ee-moon was especially built for the opium trade by the Thames Ship Building Co., Blackwall, England in 1859 to designs prepared by Mr. James Ash. During her trials she attained the speed of 17 knots an hour, the greatest speed made up to that time in British waters.

Her hull was modelled exclusively for speed, the internal fittings of the vessel was done in white enamel and gold, were at this time superior in the way of ship decoration.

She had very sharp clipper lines, originally she was engined for a paddle steamer, and during the balmy days of the opium trade was employed as a despatch boat by her owners, Jardine Matheson and Co. of Hong Kong and was used to convey information in advance of Mail Steamers. Ly-ee-moon's consumption of coal at that time was 75 tons a day at a speed of 16 knots.

After the advent of telegraphy she had a varied career in Cantonese waters and was sunk and raised again. In 1874 new engines and boilers were installed and the paddles exchanged for the modern screw propellor and the clean lines and beautiful run of hull were seen to greater advantage than ever.

Ly-ee-moon was brought to Australia by Capt. W. R. Stevens and became the property of the Australian Steam Navigation Co. She had then a saloon on the upper deck forward, a very light and airy compartment and very elegantly decorated. The panels were all works of art and considered very valuable. All of this, however, was utterly destroyed by fire while the steamer was being fitted with new engines at the A.S.N. company's workshops at Pyremont in Sydney Harbour.

The company spared no expense on her, engines and boilers were kept in thorough order. On account of her speed she was for years a favourite boat in the intercolonial trade.



#### BOWLINE

#### by Geoff Birtles

A bowline makes a loop, large or small in the end of a rope. It is a positive and absolutely secure knot that is easily untied by "breaking its back".

I have found the easiest way to learn and remember a bowline is to first form a mental picture of the finished but untightened knot (Step 4) then form the loop shown in Fig. 1A, push the tail up and through this loop (1B), now pass the tail under the standing point (2A) and back through the loop (2B and 3). Pull the tail to tighten it (4). This is not the purists way but then they don't need this kind of instruction.

Fig. 5 is a "running bowline" tied as above but around its own standing part to form a noose.

#### NEW MEMBERSHIP VSAG PROCEDURE

#### by Safety Officer

This was first published together with background scenario in February '84 Fathoms. The committee has asked that it be re-published for the benefit of our many new members who may be thinking of introducing a friend to the club.

Incidentally members are welcome to bring a guest on Club dives subject to the following:

- (i) Guest diver must be currently experienced and preferably a certified diver.
- (ii) Guest diver must have appropriate equipment in good working order and be familiar with its use.
- (iii) Member is responsible for the conduct and safe diving practice of his guest and must act as his buddy for the duration of each and every dive on the day.
- Guests are generally permitted one dive with the club prior to application for membership. (This may be waived at discretion of DC.)
- (v) Guests have second priority to club members and their booking is subject to confirmation with the DC on the evening prior to the dive.

#### NEW MEMBERSHIP PROCEDURE

#### 1. ADMISSION CRITERIA

1.1 Training &/Or Qualifications: Written evidence of a current nationally recognised basic SCUBA qualification, i.e. PADI Open Water

FAUI NQS Scuba Diver NAUI Open Water CMAS 2 Star diver

or "equivalent" as recognised by the Australian Underwater Federation or Scuba Divers Federation of Australia.

#### AUGUST 1984

#### 1.2 Experience:

Generally six months "active" experience. (This may be waived at the discretion of the committee with the President and/or Safety Officer having the power of veto).

#### 1.3 Medical Clearance:

Written evidence of a medical examination for diving eligibility that meets the requirements of either PADI, FAUI or NAUI standard procedure at time of application. Such examination to have been carried out within the 3 years immediately preceeding application.

#### 1.4 Nomination:

Applicants must be nominated and seconded by current VSAG financial members.

#### 2. APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Written application to be made on the official VSAG "New Membership Application" form.

This must be fully completed, signed and accompanied by the current joining fee and annual subscription.

#### 3. ADMISSION PROCEDURE

- 3.1 New applicants will be required to undertake a "check-out" dive with a committee member. (This may be "waived" at the discretion of the committee if the applicant has previously dived with the club as a "guest").
- 3.2 The committee will grant membership to the club on the basis of a simple majority vote subject to all admission criteria having been met and a competant check-out dive (where applicable).

#### 4. SENIOR APPLICANTS WITHOUT CERTIFICATION

- 4.1 Experienced "senior" applicants without formal qualification (as 1.1) will be considered by the committee subject to the following special conditions:
  - Minimum proven active experience 5 years.
  - A written reference in regard to diving competance, knowledge, experience and recent activity level from a currently practising diver known to and respected by the committee.

- Written evidence of an appropriate medical clearance to dive (see 1.3) performed within the 12 months immediately preceeding application.
- Inspection of equipment and satisfactory check-out dive by "Safety Officer".
- 4.2 Entry to the club will be subject to a majority committee vote with the Safety Officer and/or President having the right to vote if any one of the foregoing special conditions are not satisfied.

#### A closing note on medicals:

A medical examination which satisfies PADI standard procedure can be carried out by a local GP. It is necessary to provide the doctor with an appropriate PADI medical questionnaire at time of examination. (Obtainable from the Secretary or Treasurer courtesy of Dick Whittaker, Melbourne Dive). Should this highlight any suspect areas applicants will be referred to a "diving doctor" (such as Janine Mannerheim or John Knight) for a sport divers equivalent to an AS2299.

- .
