This brilliant photograph was taken by Kieth Jensen in May 1983 when diving the U.S. Destroyer Y. P. 284 off Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands. The divers from bottom to top are Alex Taley, Geolf Birtles and Steve Gardiner (dive guide), Reg Thomas' dive boat can be seen on the surface. The ship lies in 120 ft. of water and was sunk on Sunday 25th October 1942 when attacked by 3 Japanese Destroyers (Akatsuki, Ikazuchi and Shiratsuyu). TECHNICAL DETAILS: Kieth used a Nikonos 3 with a 15 m/m lens. The photo was taken using natural light and Fujichrome 100 A.S.A, film.

The Victorian Sub-Aqua Group was founded in 1954 and has continued as a strong and active diving club since that time. It is incorporated as a non profit company and has no commercial affiliation with any organisation.

VSAG is committed to the preservation of independant diving freedom. O FLOTSAM & JETSAM

October was quite a month for V.S.A.G. On the 13th of the month V.S.A.G. celebrated it's 30 year anniversary with a dinner dance at the North Melbourne Football Club. During the course of the evening, President Alex Talay delivered his maiden speech to the club. Alex had researched his material well and had spoken to a number of the very early members, so as he could relate some of the history of the club. Stories of utmost dare devil activities with very basic diving gear were the norm of the day back in the 1950's. Although present day members might consider the founding fathers of our club, who were some of the early pioneers of scuba diving, to be adventure seeking bravados they did setup our organisation that has lasted well over the past thirty years and hopefully will continue so long as men and women seek enjoyment under the surface.

In the early 1960's when scuba diving wasstill an unusually unheard of sport V.S.A.G. was formed into a Company Limited by Guarantee with a legally drafted constitution. This gave protection to the club and its members against legal action and provided the basis for an ongoing structure and procedure for running the club. This foresight on the part of the early members has paid off. When many other scuba clubs around Melbourne are falling by the wayside V.S.A.G. continues to maintain its presence as a strong, well managed, and good spirited club.

If this sounds like a big cheer for the club, its members and its ideals, well you're right, because some of its diving activities are absolutely ratshit.

Back in 1975 John Goulding, acting on very reliable information led a group of about 20 divers to a deserted coal mine down past Geelong. This coal mine was reported as having the clearest water east of Mt. Gambier. Undaunted by the pea green slop that rippled onto the oozing black mud of the shoreline, V.S.A.G. descended into the coldest, blackest, melliest sludge you can imagine. After 3 minutes we aborted the dive and only after a few hard questions were asked did we find out it was a well meaning joke.

Well, that experience turned me off dirty water diving but being somewhat of an old wreck buff I signed on for Des Williams'dive on the Kakariki.

The Kakariki collided with the Caradale near the Old Gellibrand Pile light off Williamstown in 1937.

On Sunday 21st October after a week of hail, sleet and rain which filled the belly of the Yarra River, we dived the remains of this old steamer. The weather remained fine, but oh the water. Like a drunken slob the Yarra spewed its rotten wasterout into the Northern end of the bay, with the result that visibility on the wreck site was 10% clarity at 2 feet, total blur at 3 feet, no visibility at 4 feet.

Now I've dived the Williamstown area on several occasions, and I kid you not, on some days I've had 30 to 40 visibility and been able to knife spear flathead.

Still it was an interesting day, particularly cruising around the majestic yachts moored at Williamstown, and the millionaire launches at the St. Kild Marina. Those poor people looked enviously at us as they sipped their champagne, and I can still hear them sigh as they wished they too could join our elite little fleet.

Sunday


Early Breakfast. Dive all day. Return to base camp.

VICTORIA'S MYSTERY SHIPWRECK T.S.S. CORAMBA



This 531 ton steel steamship was caught in the most violent storm ever to strike Victoria's coastline on 30th November, 1934. She was fully loaded en route from Warrnambool to Melbourne with a crew of 17 men, when she succumbed to the elements near Phillip Island.

To commemorate the 50th anniversary of her loss with all hands, a 100 page book about the last voyage of the "Coramba" is to be released at Port Fairy on the 30th November this year. The book is titled "Coramba – The Ship Th Sea Swallowed" and written by V.S.A.G. diver Des Williams following three years of research into the mystery. It contains many rare photographs and details of the ship's last voyage including a full transcript of an enquiry made soon after the tragedy by the Marine Board of Victoria. A full arrangement plan of the vessel is contained in a fold out section within the book. Only 1000 copies are currently being printed to ensure the book remains a collectors item. So order now.
