This brilliant photograph was taken by Kieth Jensen in May 1983 when diving the U.S. Destroyer Y P.284 off Guadalcanal, Solomon Islands. The divers from bottom to top are Alex Talay, Geoff Birtles and Steve Gardiner (dive guide). Reg Thomas' dive boat can be seen on the surface. The ship lies in 120 ft. of water and was sunk on Sunday 25th October 1942 when attacked by 3 Japanese Destroyers (Akatsuki, Ikazuchi and Shiratsuyu). TECHNICAL DETAILS: Kieth used a Nikonos 3 with a 15 m/m lens. The photo was taken using natural light and Fujichrome 100 A.S.A. film.

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

Well after an absence of 4 months out of the water, for reasons explained in last month's Flotsam & Jetsam, this article returned to the dive scene with a vengeance during September.

On September 9th under command of Don Abell in his first dive captaincy role since becoming a Committee man the V.S.A.G. boats departed from Flinders towards a rather bleak looking Bass Strait.

After an all too familiar "bash" down the coast towards Cape Schank we stopped near Bushrangers Bay when the big Mick developed engine trouble.

A lumpy and dirty sea greeted us and this diver decided that as the activity of diving was supposed to be enjoyable I might just give the dive a miss and concentrate on the hot soup.

I was not to be disappointed the following week, when on a work assignment to the Whitsunday Coast area, managed to snatch a few spare hours to fly out to the Barrier Reef. Still it was a pleasant few hours, and whilst it may not rate as a dive I can certainly recommend the area and particularly flight to the reef.

We are rapidly approaching that time of the year when V.S.A.G. members, families and friends take up the challenge of the V.S.A.G. Tennis day and Somers Mile.

This event held each year is organised by the Tipping brothers, who apart from arranging the sporting activities, also turn over their beach house at Somers.

CYLINDER TESTING

In Australia it is a requirement that all cylinders used for S.C.U.B.A. diving must be inspected and tested every 12 months. Most dive shops can test or arrange for cylinders to be tested. You can expect to wait 7 to 10 days for your cylinder and cost is from \$16 to \$20.

It is usual for the pillar valve to be checked at this time and necessary parts replaced and lubricated, should you still be using steel cylinders you may also be up for the cost of 'rumbling'.

The test pressure is determined at the time of manufacture and is stamped into the cylinder. These pressures vary according to the specification, type, and size of the cylinders, but a general rule is 1.1/3 (for steel) and 1.2/3 (for aluminium) the working pressure. This test pressure can not be up rated.

During the test the cylinder is first inspected externally for damage, corrosion or unauthorised repair. The cylinder markings are checked to establish the specification and test pressure and to verify that the markings have not been falsified. Also at this time serial numbers are checked against lists of serial numbers of cylinders that have been reported stolen.

The pillar valve is removed and the cylinder is inspected internally. A light bloom of rust in a steel cylinder is common and is not a serious problem, but heavy rusting or pitting may cause the cylinder to be condemned. Light rusting is removed by 'rumbling' i.e. partially filling the cylinder with cracked shot and then rotating it for several hours. At this stage the cylinder is ready for the hydraulic test.

For the hydraulic stretch test the cylinder is filled with water and connected to a high pressure hydraulic pump. It is then pressurised to its stamped test pressure, and its volumetric expansion is measured. The pressure is released and if the cylinder is in good condition it will return to its original size. As the cylinder ages the metal becomes less elastic and does not return to its original size. The residual expansion is known as 'permanent set' and is also measured. The permanent set must not exceed 10% of the expansion measured at the test pressure. If it exceeds this it indicates that the metal has lost its ductility, or perhaps corrosion has developed a thin patch, in any case the cylinder must be rejected.

The measurement of the cylinder expansion needs to be taken very accurately. There are two methods of hydraulically testing a cylinder and the measurement of the expansion varies slightly from one to the other.

'Non Jacket Testing', the commonest test procedure, the water filled cylinder is connected to the hydraulic pump which draws the extra water needed to pressurise the cylinder from a calibrated sight tube. When test pressure is reached the amount of water drawn from the sight tube is noted, the pressure is released and the water flows back into the tube. If the cylinder is in good condition the water in the sight tube will return to the original level, but if the cylinder has undergone some permanent set (expansion) the level in the sight glass will not reach the original level.

The inspecting company should issue a test certificate for each cylinder, showing number, relevant test and working pressure, amount of permanent set encountered and comment on the internal condition of the cylinder. The cylinder will be stamped with the date and test mark of the company.

Filling stations check cylinders for test date prior to filling and will not for any reason fill or top up a cylinder that is out of test. Also, many shops will now insist on seeing your certification card prior to filling your cylinders. *
