
The Yamazuki Maru is always a great dive with part of the wreck above the surface and the stern 100' to the sand.
TECHNICAL DETAILS: Keith used a Nikonos III 15m/m lens, Fujichrome 100 film with lighting by a Melbourne made Seastrobe 160.

The Victorian Sub-Aqua Group was founded in 1954 and has continued as a strong and active diving club since that time. It is incorporated as a non profit company and has no commercial affiliation with any organisation.

VSAG is committed to the preservation of independant diving freedom. S.D.F.-V. MEETING - 7TH NOVEMBER, 1985

- (i) Samples of S.D.F.-V. windcheaters are now available for club delegates to show to affiliated club members and offer for sale. (Interested members contact Des Williams).
- (ii) S.D.F.-V. official new logo has been registered with Copyrights Council to guard against its misuse.
- (iii) There was lengthy discussion prior to voting by delegates on whether to go with the Australian Coaching Council and establish registered dive instructors within non-profit clubs to teach people to dive. Such action, it is believed would attract new members to S.D.F.-V. affiliated clubs instead of loss of new divers to the large commercial diving groups.

At a vote the majority was in favour of the proposal. V.S.A.G. voted in the negative. It is interesting to note that many club delegates were concerned with the prickly subject of possible legal action against non-profit clubs once they become involved in diver instruction for profit. Simple club incorporation does not offer any protection against litigation.

So the meeting agreed in principle to S.D.F.-V. adopting diver training "subject to satisfactory answers being obtained regarding administrative matters and standards with a view to the scheme commencing at a later date".

- (iv) Application by the British Sub Aqua Club to become an affiliated S.D.F.-V. club was accepted by a unanimous vote and the Chairman welcomed the B.S.A.C.
- (v) The Chairman, Stuart Boden, then declared the four positions on S.D.F.-V. Management Cell vacant and called for nominations for the vacant seats. None of the four retiring office bearers were offering themselves for re-election.
- (vi) D. Williams thanked each of the retiring office bearers Stuart Boden, Neil McKenzie, Robert Watson and Particia Politz for the hard work and tireless devotion to duty to S.D.F.-V. over the last two years, since restructure of S.D.F.-V. management. There is no doubt, we as divers, owe a lot of thanks to the above four people for the last two years work.

Peter Flood - accepted


One more position is yet to be filled. The retiring committee will assist the new office bearers over the next 3 months.

BOAT OWNERS NOTE: NEW REGULATION

607A Distress Flares

- (1) All boats (other than tenders being bona fide tenders to larger boats, canoes and kayaks or boats of similar construction and design, sailing boats with permanently enclosed hulls, such as sailboards and catamarans, or the motor boat known as the Kawasaki Jet Ski) operating in Victorian coastal waters or gazetted ports shall carry the following distress flares:
 - (a) Two hand-held red flares each capable of showing a brilliant continuous red light for at least 50 seconds; and
 - (b) Two hand-held orange smoke flares each capable of emitting dense orange smoke for at least 30 seconds.
- (2) All flares so carried shall be stamped indelibly with the date of manufacture and expiry and no flare shall be so carried after the date of expiry stamped thereon.

MARLO - A TRULY GREAT ALTERNATIVE

The weekend was looking very promising indeed, as we arrived at Marlo on Friday 1st November. The trip from Frankston had been trouble free and the weather forecast seemed good enough to enable a full diving schedule.

All in all your's truly was in a relaxed and happy frame of mind and eagerly awaiting the good times ahead. That is, until I walked into the office of the Marlo Caravan & Camping Park.

Here I was greeted by what could only be described as a dragon, and her sidekick of similar stature. Upon identifying myself they produced the letter sent to them sometime beforehand and proceeded to point out that I said nothing about bringing a boat. It appears we should have booked them in too, as they were horrified when I told them there were four more to come.

Then came the potential bad news, our deposits would not be deducted from our camp fees which were payable in advance, but would be refunded upon our departure. With all the hassels that ensued it was the general consensus of opinion that our \$200 was looking very shaky indeed. However, that is another story.

At 4.15 the tent is all but erected and Keith Jensen had just arrived, he was heard mumbling something about, "I don't care lady what you say my boat is staying right here". Seems that he got the same treatment. Within another 2 hours most of the others had arrived and it was off to the pub for dinner and a few amber liquids.

At about 8.00 p.m. somebody enquired as to the whereabouts of Geoff Birtles and family, John Goulding soon enlighted us by informing all that Geoff was likely to be a few hours late as he had rung John the night before to ask him how far past Port Campbell, Marlo was. We're still not to sure if this was true but Geoff finally arrived sometime before midnight.

Saturday proved to be disappointing the wind was fairly strong and a visit to the boat ramp indicated a day of relaxation was in store. This did not seem to perturb Alex, but keen diver John Lawler was having none of it. A shore dive in zero visibility appealed to him and abelone was on the menu in the Lawler tent that evening, whilst the rest of us awaited an improvement in the weather.

We awoke on Sunday to be greeted by clear blue skies and glassy smooth seas and the camp was buzzing with excitment. Alisdair arrived with Bruce in their shinny new Haines and boat allocations were quickly made and we were off to the ramp at 10.00 a.m. Boats were quickly launched and we headed to a location called Pearl Point where the crays have been known to jump into the boat. However, all was not good as Andy's boat had blown a piston and his boat was unfortunately sidelined for the rest of the trip.

Owing to the floods the week before the water at Pearl Point resembled the Yarra river at Princes Bridge and visibility was about 6 feet. However, a few crays were caught despite this we then decided to dive at Beware Reef on the way home.

Beware Reef is situated some 6 km. S.E. of the boat ramp and it is here that the best diving seems to be. There are two wrecks located here and we stumbled onto one quite by accident, in 80 feet of water. The underwater terrain in this area quite resembled Skull Rock in a way and on a clear day it would be tremendous. The reef area surrounding the exposed reef is very extensive as we were to find the following day.

Monday morning proved to be even better than Sunday and after making certain adjustments to accommodate Andy's crew in the remaining boats we again departed for Beware Reef. Some considerate cray fishermen had marked the spot for us some 300 yards or so seaward of the reef. A quick check was the depth sounder revealed fine ledges and gullys in 60 to 70 feet of water and it was a race to gear up and drop over the side.

Visibility had improved considerably overnight to around 25 to 30 feet. The area proved to be very pricturesque and a mecca for elusive crustacean, the colour was spectacular on this reef and one got the feeling that a very enjoyable 2 weeks could be spent here given visibility of 80 feet or so which is believed to be quite common, provided no heavy rains are experienced. The area was so good that everybody agreed that it would only be necessary to move the boat 50 yards or so for the second dive which was most enjoyable.

Back at the camp that evening John Lawler's huge cray pot worked overtime cooking the catch whilst the usual cold ones were consumed and the anecdotes were related well into the night.

As usual Alex's van radiated the usual animal magnetism and was busting at the seams. Poor old Keith seemed lost in this company and was last seen lying flat on his back on the bed fully clothed and absolutely incapable of consuming another Para Port.

Well the time had passed to quickly and after packing the tent and the camp gear in the car on Tuesday morning there remained one more important task, to retrieve our deposit of \$200. I can assure you I was ready for them, complete with Geoff Birtles at my left elbow, and no way was I going to accept any lesser amount for cancellations and some slight rearrangements. Well, the whole thing proved to be a non event as the dragon handed over a cheque for \$200 and even wished us a safe trip home.

All in all the trip proved to be successful despite the poor visibility. It has been decided to return for the long weekend in March, and tent sites will be booked at the Burbang Caravan Park at Cape Conran.

SAVE THE WHALE CAMPAIGN

Dear Mr. Goulding,

I am writing to ask for your assistance in our effort to collect information on the number and nature of encounters between Man and cetaceans (whales and dolphins) in Australian Waters.

Project Jonah is a voluntary organisation concerned with all aspects of the conservation and welfare of cetaceans. An important part of our work involves learning as such as possible about the nature and behaviour of whales and dolphins in the wild.

Cetaceans are well-known for their curiosity in, and friendly disposition towards, Man. We are keen to collect as many reports as possible of such encounters. Accordingly, we have recently established a programme entitled the "Dolphin Not-Line", whereby we are inviting anybody who has had such an experience to write to us and tell us about it.

Eventually, we hope to be able to publish a collection of these anecdotes. Such a publication would serve both to provide valuable insights into the behaviour of whales and dolphins, and also to make people generally more aware of the value of protecting these gentle, intelligent creatures.

I enclose a copy of a questionnaire we would very much like you to include in your next Club Newsletter. We would, of course, be happy to cover printing costs if necessary.

I hope you will be able to help us in what promises to be a very exciting programme, and which will, ultimately, be to the benefit of all whales and dolphins.

AN AWARD FOR CLUB DIVING PARTICIPATION

A competition allowing members of the Melbourne Bottom Scratchers, and Marine Diving Group and the Victorian Sub-Aqua Group to vie for some valuable prizes will be run during 1986.

The idea for the competition is the brainchild of John Gibson, of John's Dive Shop, and John Lawler of V.S.A.G., with support from the committee of the three clubs who are keen to see some "vigour" injected into the club diving scene, and John Gibson has donated some excellent prizes in conjunction with his suppliers.

First Prize: A "NEPTUNE" top of the range 7mm Pro "divers

ensemble" (we used to call them wetsuits), supplied courtesy of John's Dive Shop and Neptune Aquasuits - value \$ 380.00.

Second Prize: An 88 cubic foot alloy cylinder, supplied courtesy

of John's Dive Shop and R. Wallace Mitchell -

value \$ 270.00.

Plus at least 2 runner-up prizes to be provided by the participating clubs, consisting of three 2 dozen packs of beer and one hamper of seafood.

The object of the competition is to enthuse club divers and to provide an incentive to support the club itinerary. It is also aimed to foster club interaction, friendship and friendly competition. Winners will be chosen on the basis of the greatest number of club dives undertaken by a club member.

To make verification of dives possible, only club dives will be eligible for inclusion. The three participating clubs have similar interests and itineraries, and an effort will be made by the club committee to maintain a close similarity during 1986.

Dive eligibility will be determined as follows:

1. It must be a scheduled club dive between 1/1/86 and 31/12/86.

- 2. All venues are included, even club trips overseas (the latter mainly because of the technical difficulties in excluding them).
- Dives must be performed using SCUBA or hookah.
- 4. Excludes any unsafe acts such as solo anchor retrieval.
- 5. Any disputes arising will be arbitrated by the club members making up the steering committee.

After each club dive, divers wishing to participate in the competition are to voluntarily approach the Dive Leader, who will record their names and number of dives for the day on a provided entry sheet. These sheets will be passed on to a co-ordinator appointed by each club committee, who will act as a record-keeper. The progress of the competition will be monitored quarterly by the competition steering committee consisting of the three Club Presidents and John Gibson.

The deserving winners will be announced and the prizes presented early in 1987 at a special social function, the venue and date of which are yet to be decided.

SPLICE THE MAINBRACE

In 1687, following the conquest of Jamaica the Royal Navy introduced the ration of one pint of neat run to each man and one half pint to each boy aboard.

Admiral Vernon concerned with the high incidence of drunkness in his fleet ordered that the mens and boys ration of rum be diluted by adding 1 quart of water and that it be issued in two halves at noon and at 6.00 p.m. daily.

Admiral Vernon's nickname in the fleet was "Old Grogram", from the material of which his cloak was made, and the watered down rum was given the name "Grog". The word groggy is derived from too large an intake of the spirit. The daily issue of grog was made up by the purser in a Grog Tub, a cut down cask which had inscribed upon it in brass letter "God Save The King" (or Queen). The mixture of three quarts water to one part rum was always made in the presence of an officer to protect the seamen from being given a short allowance of rum by adding to much water. "To Drown the Miller" an old expression used by sailors to indicate that more than the statutory amount of water had been added by the purser to make the rum go further and pocket the profits for himself.

Any grog that was left after the daily issue was known as "Plush". Official instructions were that any plush after the daily issue was to be poured into the scuppers and allowed to run overboard to prevent anyone getting more than his ration but seamen were adapt at saving such waste.

The evening issue of grog was abolished in the Royal Navy in 1824 and the daily ration reduced to one gill (one quarter of a pint) in 1850. A traditional navy term Splice the Main Brace is used for serving out an additional tot of rum. In sailing ship days the Main Brace was Spliced after a period of severe exertion in heavy weather more as a pick-me-up for the crew than any other purpose.

Now since 1970, rum is no longer issued to the Navy it is no longer possible to Splice the Main Brace.
