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
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## COVER

This ship known locally as the "Bonegi 1" was wrecked near Tassafaronga Point, Quadalcanal, Solomon Islands during flerce fighting in World War 2. It is one of the wrecks that can be dived from the shore near the Bonegi River and Copra Plantation.

The Yamazuki Maru is always a great dive with part of the wreck above the surface and the stern 100' to the sand.

TECHNICAL DETAILS: Keith used a Nikonos III 15m/m lens.
Fujichrome 100 film with lighting by a Melbourne made Seastrobe 160.

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#### SORRENTO DIVE

Arrived at Big Micks 9.00 a.m., after loading the boat and hooking it up, kissed the wife and kids, kicked the dog and we're off.

Shocking day, cold, windy and raining, still we arrived at the car park by 10.00. Mick even made it in on the first try. There were plenty of divers cars but no-one in sight. Heading down to Marty's shop, there they were, having brekky, hot chocolate and toast all round. We gave them a hurry up - "Let's go diving!!"

Finally geared up, launched the boats, and off. Tippo nearly missed his ride - too busy talking to someone on the beach - had to call the boat back to pick him up. First plan of the day was to dive Spectacular Reef, approaching the dive site Mick turned on the depth sounder. "Bloody things not working, he muttered, just paid \$28.00 to have it serviced". He gave it a few light clouts for good measure, but to no avail. As Igor caught up to us we decided to change the dive spot to Micks cray spot.

First to kit up were Warren and Don. Mick motored up to his marks. then over the side into 100' of water with a raging current. With a dive plan of twenty minutes they were back within ten. Going down was OK, said Don, but nearing the bottom visibility was just a blur, we were moving fast with 6' vis. and reefs looming up for nowhere. Don passed over the top of Warren knocking Warren's reg. out of his mouth, Don also noticed Warren's catch bag was snagged on the reef. As the current swept Don on he looked back to see Warren snagged on the reef with reg. streaming in the wild water. Don finally managed to dig the hook in and waited, unable to get back to help. In the meantime Warren cooly managed to free himself, though still unable to reach his reg. By now Warren had caught up to Don who was waiting with his Octopus reg. in hand. Warren, with no air to purge, swallowed air/water. After a pause to regain control, Don retrieved Warren's reg. and they surfaced. Lucky he had a good dive buddy and a cool head. He also lost a fin. After that Mick said, "Bugger going in there - let's have lunch."

### S.S. "MILORA" AT REST AND REVISITED:

It seems my article in May "Fathoms" about S.S. "Milora" and the Ships Graveyard was worth the effort. For the past 13 or 14 years I have dreamed of diving this gigantic ship, deep in the Graveyard.

As the majority of V.S.A.G. dives these days are in the persuit of marine decapods, my enthusiasm for dropping over the side of a boat has somewhat waved lately. If only a little more time could be devoted to searching for new wrecks, everyone would be happy, even the diehard cray divers.

A few days after the release of May "Fathoms" my prayers were answered when V.S.A.G. member Ian Scholes telephoned me to say he had located the resting place of S.S. "Milora" back in December and would happily show us the site. This was not exactly the response I had expected; at best one or two V.S.A.G.'ers who might have expressed interest in such a search but someone who knew where the "Milora" lay, incredible!!

It was the first day of winter and the sea was as flat as a nightman's cap! Alex Talay was D.C. for what was to have been a submarine dive, but now the location had been altered. We assembled at 10.00 a.m. at Sorrento. There was Mick Jeacle's boat crewed by Alex, Pat and Geoff Birtles - John Goulding's boat crewed by Des, John Lawler and Warren Cannen and Ian Scholes in his boat as guide with friend Wayne.

We were soon skimming over the glassy surface to Point Lonsdale and into Bass Strait via the Four Fingers West Passage, and on down the coast past Barwon Heads towards Torquay; a total of 35 kms from Sorrento. We were now deep into the "Foulground" when we paused for a cup of hot soup. Bass Strait was in a sleepy mood, almost like an endless pond, which was fortunate indeed, as we looked back towards the Heads and could hardly make out Lonsdale lighthouse. No place to be in a rough sea, so far from home.

Ian very quickly lined up his transit marks and we were soon hovering over the 3,300 ton derelict "Milora".

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For the next 15 minutes Mick, Geoff, John & Des scribbled away with their crayons, taking transit marks. The atmosphere was perfectly clear (a good day for transits) with no sign of fog at all; in fact we were able to see Mt. Macedon from Sorrento before we set off!!

With the paperwork behind us, we suited up to dive with Geoff and Mick being first to hit the water, followed by Wayne and Ian and Alex and Pat. Our group waited for their return to stay with the boats.

Very soon, all divers were seen clearly staged at 10 ft. hanging off for decompression. All divers did heaps of time on the deco rope, as an added safety factor because of the extreme depth of this wreck.

John G, Warren, John Lawler and myself descended the anchor rope waiting for the bulk of the "Milora" to come into view. At 130 ft. huge steel plates could be seen and John G and I levelled off to take charge of our senses at about 150 ft. We then set off in a westerly direction towards the stern, but not really realising the enormity of this wreck. A huge bollard lay at a crazy angle on the portside, then one the the ship's massive masts was made out leaning out in a northerly direction. The "Milora" seems to be lying at at 60° angle on her port side with the mast now almost lying on the sand. The root of the mast has torn up the deck as it has sagged overboard.

At this point, John and I swam back past the anchor line, which lead back to the surface, to explore the wreck in an easterly direction. We passed over the lip of an enormous hold steering towards the port side of the wreck and went over the twisted safety railing. Some very large steel cables bent around another huge bollard came into view here, as did John Goulding pointing to his watch and motioning time was up, we must ascend.

Unfortunately, the visibility was down to 15 ft. on the wreck this day but the potential is there for better viz in high summer. The Graveyard rarely yields a clear dive, because of the close proximity of the Barwon River and in winter it churns out heaps of mud. Still, there have been some days in mid summer when visibility in this area has been around 80 - 100 ft., so we can look forward to those days ahead.

At present, I am assembling details of the "Milora" including a general arrangement plan of the ship's layout which will hopefully make us more organised on future dives. Time is so limited at this depth, that a sketch plan of the ships attitude and layout will make it easier to see more in the short time available. Keep an eye on future issues of "Fathoms" for more details.

Once again, our thanks for a great dive go to Ian and Wayne. \*

# Fisherman over-reacts

The Herald, Monday, June 23rd MR HUNT in his fishing column of May 30 seems to be over-reacting to the declaration of marine parks around Wilsons Promontory National

These marine parks mean that only 0.5 per cent of the state's waters are now protected compared to more than 5 per cent of the land area. The area of the parks in which fishing is banned comprises 0.1 per cent of coastal waters. If it is the "thin end of the wedge", it is mighty thin!

There is no threat to recreational fishing from small areas of marine parks — in fact the aim of these areas is to conserve fish so as to ensure that fishermen will have something to catch in the future. This association proposed the Wilson's Promontory marine park and we can assure Mr Hunt that we certainly would not under any circumstance be suggesting that Ricketts Point be a "marine national park".

I hope that Mr Hunt will check the details of the zoning plans for the Prom marine park and realise such areas are set aside to conserve fishing resources. We would hope fishermen will realise the value of such reserves as have shooters in the past recognised the value of game reserves.

# PARK TO PUT FISHERMEN ON THE ROCKS? By DEE WREN


On Sunday, a large southern section of Wilson's Promontory officially became a marine park subject to all the restrictions surrounding a protected area.

The restrictions mean that local rock lobster and abalone fishermen will no longer have access to what have traditionally been their most lucrative fishing grounds in eastern Victoria.

Ross Wellman, a crayfisherman from Flinders and the Victorian representative of the Victorian Professional Fishermen Association - crayfishing division, said last week that the marine park proclamation had virtually "sounded the death knell" for people in the industry.

"Crayfishermen have fished the waters around Wilson's Prom for 75 years without any detriment to the environment.

"And we've certainly not overfished the area.



 The rocky reefs around the southern tip of Wilson's Promontory have been the main cray fishing grounds in Eastern Victoria for 75 years.

The licence system - which incidentally the association has been largely responsible for initiating to protect our own industry - ensures that every professional fisherman is constantly self-policing the catch," Ross said.

# Vulnerable to poachers

According to Ross Wellman and other local fishermen, proclaiming the southern third of the Prom as a marine park, has virtually meant its inevitable destruction.

Conservation Forest and

Lands Minister, Joan Kirner who has stated she wants the area to remain in 'a pristine condition' has now left the waters around this part of the Prom vulnerable to overfishing by amateur rock lobster fishermen and divers. Ross said.

"There is no way the area can be policed properly. A boat load of divers will be able to go out, each pulling out the allowed four crays and ten abalone per person, without anyone around to see if these are undersized.

There are only three places where policing boats can be launched, so the poachers will simply have a spotter able to warn them in ample time."

Ross said that many people had the wrong idea about local professional rock lobster or cray fishermen.

"They seem to think we have the whole Victorian coast to fish in. Nothing could be further from the truth.

"For a start, our licences are for the eastern section of the state and in this area, the rocky reefs which are the crays' habitats, are few and far between.

"By taking away the Prom, where we have fished for 75 years, it has removed 70 percent of our grounds," he said.

Ross Wellman claimed the Minister had given way to pressure from 'greenies' in proclaiming the park.

What was the good of

keeping the area (the southern part of Wilson's Promontory) as a marine park, when there were not even tracks to allow it to be enjoyed by people, he asked. It was also a dangerous area in the south for amateur divers without experience, he said.

#### Unremarkable

According to local fishermen, the new marine park has few remarkable species. The main species of marine life are reef fish such as leatherjacks, morwong and sea-perch and of course rock lobsters and abalone.

The marine park extends 300 metres from the shore taking in the rocky reefs that forms the rock lobsters' habitat.

It also takes in areas around the small groups of islands such as the Glennie Group which traditionally has been an emergency refuge for fishermen during bad weather.

Ross said that professional fishing would be phased out in the marine park over the next few years but that the fishermen involved had no other area to turn to as an alternative.

This meant that the expensive licence endorsements which fishermen had to buy would become virtually worthless, he

Several local boars were now up for sale as their owners realised their livelihoods were now under threat, Ross said.

"But who is going to buy them?

"If the government is serious about protecting our coastal waters, while it should be looking at is poaching, rather than professional fishermen

who take care of the

"Off Flinders alone, I have seen 75 divers go out in the space of just over an hour. And each is allowed to take out four crays and ten abalone.

"I've heard of another small group boast about taking out and selling 72kgs of crays just before Christmas."

"There was another group last summer at the Sorrento back beach, who pulled out everything they saw including undersized crays - and cooked them up for their beach parts."

"But while there's money for a marine park, there's no money for extra officers and vessels to police this dangerous type of poaching.

Ross said the main problem was the fact that there were so few professtonal fishermen in Victoria. He estimated there were only about 1300 spread throughout the state, too few he said to make an effective lobby group to politicians concerned with votes.

"We're concerned with our livelihood. Already we have people leaving the local industry. Others have their boats up for sale although this is difficult to do with the low eatch rates now and the restrictions imposed with the Eastern zone licences.

And it's not just a few families that are involved. It is also the other small businesses throughout the peninsula who provide support industries for fishermen.

"All we're asking for is limited access to Wilson's Prom and a stepping-up by the government with action against peachets who are destroying the industry and the environment."

#### **NEW ZEALAND DIVING - For \$50.00**

As mentioned in June Fathoms a club overseas diving holiday is planned for March 1988. With the proven success of savings investment funds in the past, in particular the one instigated in 1982 for Fiji, a new savings fund will be commenced on the evening of the July general meeting.

At this point I am thankful for keeping past copies of Fathoms. I am sure Geoff Birtles will not mind me quoting certain information from December 1982 issue to refresh the memories of all members as to the purpose of the scheme.

#### Background Thinking

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Not every diver has the financial resouces to trip overseas as and when his fancy takes him. Some have never been overseas at all and for many such a short term prospect of doing so is zero. Others in better financial shape fail to materialise their planning on the grounds that there's always a more practical use for the money at the time, or perhaps they can't really afford to finance their non-diving spouse (and wish to remain married!).

But this needn't be. Recognized that time passes quickly and small amounts of money diligently accumulated over a lengthy period add up to big dollars. Self indulgent dollars that can be spent free of guilt because they have been accumulated painlessly for a specific purpose.

#### How It Happens (In Brief)

- (i) A common investment fund is established into which unit holders make 20 monthly subscriptions of \$50.00 (\$1,000.00).
- (ii) Additional funds over and above the minimum payment of \$50.00 may be made at the discretion of the individual unit holder; e.g. \$70.00 or maybe even \$100.00.
- (iii) A ledger card is maintained both for the common fund and individual unit holders.

- (iv) Accrued funds and accrued interest are allocated and distributed to unit holders at the close of the fund (February 1988) on the basis of 100% return of all subscriptions, plus pro-rata share of all interest - less expenses associated with setting up and maintaining the fund.
- (v) Should a unit holder elect to pull out of the scheme prior to maturity he may do so but any contributions made will not be refundable until maturity viz: February 1988. However normal interest will continue to accrue.
- (vi) The fund commences at the July general meeting when the first payment of at least \$50.00 should be paid. Subsequent subscriptions will be due by general meeting dates. Postal subscriptions may be made by cheque payable V.S.A.G. Overseas Investment Fund accompanied by a short note to ensure accurate identification. These postal subscriptions must be sent to Mick Jeacle, 5 Donn Close, Frankston, 3199.
- (vii) Sound and prudent business and investment principles will apply.

#### Summary

We hope members will respond positively to this exciting plan. Remember we have at our disposal a luxurious craft almost 60 feet in length. Wives and children will be able to come out on all dives in the Bay of Islands area so it will be a complete holiday for all attending. I hope to soon have photographs of the boat and will include these in a future magazine. Future issues will also contain more about the venue and its many other attractions.
