This ship known locally as the "Bonegi 1" was wrecked near Tassalaronga Point, Quadalcanal, Solomon Islands during lierce flighting in World War 2. It is one of the wrecks that can be dived from the shore near the Bonegi River and Copra Plantation.

The Yamazuki Maru is always a great dive with part of the wreck above the surface and the stern 100' to the sand.

#### GENERAL BUSINESS:

1. John Goulding told the Club that he had attended the meeting at Tidal River on the 22nd August. 
## **NEW ZEALAND OVERSEAS TRIP**

### STANDARD DRESS V.S.A.G. 'ERS

For many years now I have wanted to dive in the traditional "hard hat" equipment, but where does one find such equipment still in working order?

The answer came when Keith Jensen mentioned to my old friend Dick Whitacker, that I would be a starter for his pilot course in Standard Dress Diving.

Dick and Brian of Melbourne Diving Services, have for years wanted to conduct a diving course using the traditional equipment. At last they have got all of the gear together.

During a weekend in July this year, the first course of its kind in Melbourne was run by ex Navy Clearance Diver, Ray Gosper at M.D.S. in Heidelberg.

We were eased into the equipment by firstly doing a dry dress rehearsal on the Friday evening. Then on the Saturday and Sunday we dived in M.D.S. 30 ft deep tank using both a U.S. Navy Mark 5 outfit (CIRCA 1943) and then a Japanese YOKAHAMA dress (CIRCA 1950's).

As you will see by the photographs, M.D.S. were fully equipped with steel cage and winch to lower us to the bottom of the tank. The cage was then raised to the surface after the diver had stepped out on the bottom. For the next half an hour we would adjust our bouyancy by controlling the air valves and exhausts. I recall rising off the bottom like the space shuttle, but managed to dump a load of air before going up too far, then landed with a loud bump on the bottom once again. Finding neutral bouyancy about 10 ft off the bottom and hanging their suspended like a man in space was a great experience.

Both outfits were fitted with radio telephone to the surface which made the dives even more interesting. After 30 minutes, Ray Gosper would say time to come up. The diver then inflated the suit very slowly and controlled the rise to the surface un-assisted. Once on the surface the diver would climb into the cage for the final winch to the floor level of the training room.

All students helped to dress each diver and tend to airlines. There were seven divers in our class, namely: Alex Talay

A fantastic experience indeed and we plan to do a sea dive in summer when Dick and Brian can organize all of the necessary equipment. If time allows, I will show a selection of slides taken during the training dives at our September general meeting. \*






# Time's up for shark

NEW YORK, Mon., AFP — A digital watch in perfect working order could help identify the owner of a severed hand found in a shark's stomach, police at St Petersburg, Florida, said yesterday.

The shark was caught by three students in Tampa Bay, Florida, but police have had no reports of shark attacks in the area.

They said the shark, about 1.5 metres long, was a "black-tip," not a species that usually attacks people.

They thought the partially-digested hand had been swallowed less than 24 hours earlier.

# Reef fence to keep out starfish

BRISBANE, Mon., AAP — Underwater fences will be built on Queensland's Great Barrier Reef this week in an experiment to control the spread of the Crown of Thorns starfish.

Scientists in north Queensland will test various designs of fences, buoyed nets and tangle nets during the week-long program at John Brewer Reef, a popular tourist stop near Townsyille.

Conducted by the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority, the tests would determine whether harriers or nets could protect cleared areas of the reef from being reoccupied by other starfish, chairman Graeme Kelleher said.

Divers would observe the starfish around the clock and underwater videos would be used to monitor their reactions to the barriers, he said.

Scientists from James Cook University at Townsville were helping in the experiment, needed to preserve the future of important tourism and scienctific areas," Mr Kelleher raid.

The tests will follow recent starfish control exercises on Grub Reef, 70 km off Townsville, conducted by divers from the authority and the Royal Australian Navy in July. OCTOBER 1986 PAGE 17

September, 1986

The Editor,
