

Congratulations to Des Williams on his appointment to the Victorian Historic Shipwrecks Advisory Committee. Des' keen interest and considerable knowledge of Victorian shipwrecks is sure to be a valuable talent to the Advisory Committee.

In the last issue of Fathoms we published the first Fathoms - "Picture of the Issue". This issue, just a month before the Annual General Meeting and the Committee elections we show a picture of our hardworking Committee after an eventful session at Des' place in June. COMMITTEE NEWS

The following points are a summary of major issues raised at the June and July Committee Meetings.

- * All Club bank accounts have been transferred to the National Mutual Royal Bank.
- * On Club trips away it will be the Dive Captains responsibility to advise members each evening of the start time of the next day's diving activity.
- * Des Williams has been nominated to sit on the Victorian Historic Shipwrecks Advisory Committee.
- * Club funds as at 27th July were \$6,000.80.
- * The Club will purchase 12 Diver Safety Sausages to be allocated to Club members dive boats for use by divers.
- * The Club entry in the Yellow Pages telephone directory will be changed from Pat Reynolds number to Igor Chernichov's number. Igor works from home and thus will be able to provide a 24 hour service?!
- * The Club will introduce a charge on the use of club tanks to offset the cost of tank testing and maintenance.
 - A fee of \$10.00 will need to be paid when the tank is borrowed. \$5.00 will be refunded if the tank is returned FULL within 7 days.
 - If the tank requires filling or topping up no refund will be available.
 - If the tank is not returned within 7 days without prior arrangement an additional fee maybe required to be paid.
- * Various suggestions were put forward for the Christmas Function but final decision is yet to be made.*

S.D.F-V MEETING - TUESDAY 2/8/1988

Clubs present: British Sub-Aqua Club, Valley Divers, Aust. Postal Institute, Bass Strait Diving Club, Black Rock, Melbourne Bottom Scratchers and V.S.A.G.

- (i) Point Nepean National Park to open in October 1988. D. Williams reported that much excavation work has been done and many galleries and fortifications are soon to be open to the public.
- (ii) A message from Ministry for Planning & Environment advises a meeting will be held in October to which all sporting bodies will be invited. The subject will be Public Liability Insurance for sporting clubs - more details at next S.D.F.-V. meeting.
- (iii) Australian Piscatorial Council requires S.D.F.-V. input on a fishing survey. As this is for inland waters fish we need not action.
- (iv) As a result of the increase in diving accidents and divers needing recompression over the last few years the Government had asked each State to look into the situation some time ago. Michael Jackson (B.S.A.C.) reported W.A., S.A., Vic. & N.S.W. are not planning any legislative control on divers instruction as yet.
- (v) Financial status of S.D.F.-V. \$ 498.04 Interest Account \$ 379.46 General Account \$ 978.80 Investment Account \$ 1,856.30
- (vi) The next Annual S.D.F.-A. meeting is to be held in Victoria between January 26-29th 1989, Victoria to be the host State.
- (vii) A combined social night for all S.D.F.-V. affiliated Club to be organized for early 1989.
- (viii) The subject of divers involved in an incident near the Heads was discussed, with D. Williams explaining details of the incident for the benefit of members present. All agreed that there is now

great demand on the exciting dive sites within the Heads area. Slack water can be a very busy time with private boats, charter boats and commercial shipping all requiring the same space so extra care must now be taken.

- (ix) S.D.F.-V. urgently need a representative to sit on the Victorian Recreational Fisheries Advisory Committee. This Committee advises the Minister and it is essential we look after our interests and comment on matters concerning our rights to take underwater species in the future. If anyone in V.S.A.G. is seriously interested in protecting divers rights in V.R.F.A.C. then get off your butt and talk with Des Williams about representing S.D.F.-V. now!!
- (x) S.D.F.-V. has recommended D. Williams as its representative on the Historic Shipwrecks Advisory Committee to replace David Carroll who has had to resign due to work commitments.
- * The next S.D.F.-V. meeting will be held at 8.00 p.m. on Tuesday 4th October, 1988.

Anyone with questions on the above items should contact D. Williams on 551 3201.*

V.S.A.G. SAFETY PROCEDURES

The Committee of the V.S.A.G. has determined the following safety procedures which are to be adhered to by all members on Club dives.

- The Dive Captain is to take all responsibility for arrangements and safety for the days diving activities. The Club Safety Officer is to act only in the role of an observer and advisor to the Dive Captain.
- 2. For each Club dive the plan is to be announced and adhered to unless alteration is cleared by the Dive Captain.
- 3. When diving as a group of boats under anchor one or more boats should be manned to aid any calls of distress from divers and ensure the safety of the other boats.
- The Club advocates that divers use the "buddy" system whenever possible.
- 5. When diving in and around the Rip, shipping movements should be checked out. No divers to submerge if any ship is within sight.
- 6. When problems arise on the surface and divers are on a bouy line they should be pulled up by the surface craft. The person holding on the bouy is to control the diving of his buddies and they should therefore surface on his instruction.
- 7. At least one boat diving each day should carry a club oxygen cylinder with adaptor.
- 8. New members should always be paired with experienced diversin the Club. This procedure should be carried out for a considerable period after membership to ensure that the Club is satisfied with their capabilities and that they are given every confidence in their own ability and the ability of other members.
- 9. The Boat Captain is to take responsibility in his boat to brief the divers on procedures to be adopted for the days diving.*

A THREE DIVE DAY

I feel that I should write an article in regard to the dive on 26th June. It is most important that I personally squash any rumours that I caught an enormous crayfish on the day. The truth is that it was only a 9 pounder. I know that some divers think $\underline{\text{that}}$ is big, but I only consider that it upholds my personal average.

BOAT OWNERS

Boat Owners - make sure your boat safety equipment is up to standard as required by law.

- An approved life jacket with reflective tape for each person on board.
- * Bailer or manual or other efficient bilge pump.
- * Fire extinguisher.

- * Waterproof torch in working order.
- * Anchor with not less than:

 45 metres of rope for boats up to 5 metres.

 50 metres of rope for boats 5 to 8 metres.
- * 2 hand held red flares and 2 hand held orange smoke flares. (Flares must be "in date").
- * 2 paddles for boats up to 5 metres. *



The Annual General Meeting of the V.S.A.G. will be held at the North Melbourne Football Club on September 15th commencing at 8.00 p.m.

The Annual General Meeting is the most important meeting of the year.

This year there will be 4 members of the Committee standing down in accordance with the terms of our constitution. They are:-

Whilst each of the above may seek re-nomination, this should not deter other members from seeking nomination if they are interested in giving up a bit of time and putting in a little effort for the Club.

In this month we have included nomination forms.

If you wish to be nominated to the Committee seek a proposer and a seconder, sign the acceptance clause and have it returned to the Club Post Office Box or the Secretary, Don Abell NO LATER THAN THURSDAY, 1ST SEPTEMBER.

Similarly if you want to propose another member get the nomination form completed and returned by the due date.

V.S.A.G TO EQUIP BOATS WITH SAFETY SAUSAGES

In the early days of diving, V.S.A.G. was one of the first, if not $\underline{\text{the}}$ first club to insist on bouyancy vests for divers.

Since those days we've come a long way and no self respecting diver would be without a "B.C." Whilst bouyancy compensators have become very sophisticated with sky-high prices to match, a new and very simple diver safety device has come on the market and will be purchased by the Club for member use.

The Safety Sausage is a 1.8 metre plastic film tube that rolls up to a small bundle which can easily be kept in a B.C. pocket or stuck up your wetsuit.

A diver on the surface can attract the attention of his boat crew, or other vessels by inflating the tube and holding it upright.

The Club will purchase 12 of these Safety Sausages, and allocate 2 to each of the most often used members' boats. A diving pair will then take one Sausage between them.

Members allocated a Safety Sausage will be responsible for its return to the appropriate boat. Should loss or damage occur to the Sausage, the member using it will be required to replace it.

Whilst V.S.A.G. has rarely had to go chasing its own drifting divers, the acquisition of this equipment will further reduce the problem of locating divers on the surface.*

NAUTICAL NOUNS

OR

EXTRACTS FROM A DICTIONARY FOR LAND LUBBERS, OLD SALTS, & ARMCHAIR DRIFTERS.

BASIC OR STRIPPED BOATS: A term commonly used by boatbuilders and salesmen to describe what is specifically covered in the advertised price of a boat.

The basic boat normally consists of several hundred gallons of fibreglass resins and glue, a hundred or so sheets of marine plywood, a ton or more of lead and steel, a sewing kit, and an instruction book. By contrast, the basic boat with options and in "sailaway condition" – a somewhat more expensive proposition – boasts a host of convenient extras, such as a deck, a cabin, an engine, a galley, an anchor, a tiller or wheel, a rudder, and a cockpit; and sails, spars, rigging, fittings and portholes.

BATTERY: Electrochemical storage device capable of lighting an incandescent lamp of a wattage about equal to that of a refrigerator bulb for a period of 15 minutes after having been charged for two hours.

BERTH: Any horizontal surface whose total area does not exceed one half of the surface area of an average man at rest, onto which at least one litre of some liquid seeps during any 12 hour period and above which there are not less than 10 kilograms of improperly secured objects.

BILGE: Strictly speaking, the lowest spaces inside the hull, where poorly understood chemical reactions among the liquids which collect there create a slow-moving, viscious substance which some scientists believe is a primitive form of life, but now, more commonly, the substance itself.

BINOCULARS: Entertaining shipboard kaleidoscope which, when held up to the light, reveals interesting patterns and designs caused by salt spray, thumbprints, and scratches. Uncapped, its lenses may also be employed to collect small amounts of salt from seawater through evaporation.

BITTER END: One of only eight names authorised by the Coast Guard for establishments serving alcoholic beverages in harbour areas. The other are: The Outrigger, The Beachcomber, The Hatch, The Rusty Rudder, The Crow's Nest, The Jolly Roger, and Barnacle Bill's.

BOARDING: The knowledgable sailor does not "get on" a boat or "climb in" a boat - he boards a boat. And the prudent individual does not "stay behind," "keep off" or say "the hell with it" - he remains ashore.

CHANTY: Traditional sea song, like "Skeg o'My Heart", "My Darling Brigantine", "Try to Remember the Kind of Sub Tender", and "Catch a Falling Spar".

CHART: 1. A large piece of paper that is useful in protecting cabin and cockpit surfaces from food and beverage stains.

- 2. A common decorative motif on place mats.
- 3. A nautical map that assists the boatman in determining whether he is on the water (blue on charts) or on the land (yellow).

CHARTER: Chartering agencies operate quite openly in the "red-buoy" districts of most harbors. They offer "bare-boats", "cat-boats", "jolly-boats", and other "aweigh-for-pay" craft, and if you have the "jack" - \$100 a day and up - its "Hello, sailor!".

FISH: Any living creature that does not call the Coast Guard when faced with the prospect of being submerged for more than one minute.

FLOTSAM: Anything floating in the water from which there is no response when an offer of a cocktail is made.

JETSAM: Too often, shipboard refuse is unceremoniously dumped over the side with no attention whatsoever to the nautical niceties. That pile of untidy refuse in the bottom of a bucket may not look like much, but those unsung "silent crew members" have done their part to contribute to the success of the voyage, and they are deserving of respect as they are committed to the deep.

KETCH: Disagreeable clause in boat-purchase contract.

SHIPSHAPE: A boat is said to be shipshape when every object that is likely to contribute to the easy handling of the vessel, or the comfort of the crew, has been put in a place from which it cannot be retrieved in less than 30 minutes.

WINCHES: Jocular term for compliant and helpful young ladies on a sailboat. By contrast, women who are serious sailors but dull company are called "windlasses".

YACHT BROKER: Form of coastal marine life found in many harbors. Generally thought to occupy a position on the evolutionary scale above algae, but below the clam.*
