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EDITORIAL

It seems that diving is under threat again! This time it Commercial Fishing Lobby who are attacking us. They have out submissions to the State Government suggesting banning the taking crayfish and abalone by divers using compressed air.

This move together with the Conservation Forests & Lands Department's current work on banning the taking of fish on SCUBA, may well result in divers having no rights at all to take a meal home.

One can understand why the Commercial Fishing Industry might be concerned about the impact of divers on their

livelihood. The number of amateur recreational divers has certainly increased in recent years, and the sight of boat loads of evil looking wet suited "underwater plunderers" would certainly disturb me if I had a couple of hundred thousand dollars tied up in a cray boat or abalone licence.

However, I believe that this is largely an emotive issue, but still one that could seriously effect our sport unless handled properly and rationally - and this will be difficult to do because of lack of statistical data.

The taking of crayfish by SCUBA is by no means easy or terribly efficient when compared to the commercial method of "pot Weather conditions, trapping". time availability, baq limitations and the natural ability of crayfish to avoid capture all stack up as obstacles to the diver. True, . . . there are some divers who are more skilled than most in catching crays and in this Club there are 5 or 6 members who fall into this category. The rest, like me, would bloody well starve to death if our life depended on a crayfish diet.

However, the commercial fishermen probably do not understand this. If they are seeing the crayfish stocks being depleted they should look firstly at their own Industry. Its an insult to intelligence to suggest that amateur recreational divers have a significant impact on the crayfish population.

I have no time, nor should any self respecting diver, have any time for the unlicenced poaching of crayfish or abalone. Such practices do give divers a rotten name and offenders deserve to be caught and heavily penalized. Yet the law does not take this matter seriously enough. Several months ago we published in Fathoms the penalties handed out to a number of abalone poachers who had been brought to court. They were each fined the grand amount of \$150.00. What a joke!!!

The SCUBA Divers Federation of Victoria will be fighting this issue and let us hope that proper consideration will be given to all of the issues, so that the freedom of recreational divers to "hunt" within the constraints of current laws will be protected.

A matter that concerns me greatly about this whole issue is that it could be a very biased battle. You only have to look at the problem which duck shooters have faced over recent years — and they were only fighting the Conservation Lobby. The issue that we face whilst on first impressions may be against the Commercial Fishing Lobby, however we should not forget that the over zealous conservationalists within the Government and public service bodies have already excluded large areas of Victoria's coastline from crayfish and abalone catching. Perhaps the only reason why duck shooting is still permitted in this State is because the duck hunters were very well organized and massed huge demonstrations against the withdrawal of their rights. I can't see divers taking the same action . . .

The Committee elections held at the Annual General Meeting in September returned Don Abell and Ross Luxford to the Committee and produced 3 new Committee Members: Neil Medhurst, Sant Khan and Sally Staddon. At time of going to press the selection process for the Club's Office Bearers had not occurred due to the 2222222222

l week postponement of the September Committee Meeting. However without pre-empting any appointments, I would like to add my commendation of Don Abell to Des William's remarks at the A.G.M. Don has served 2 years as a very fine President of the Club and has provided excellent leadership and representation. He has shown good judgement and conducted the Club's business in a professional, yet friendly manner. I am sure that all members would endorse these remarks and on behalf of the members - Well done Don and thanks.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

30TH JUNE, 1990

1. PRINCIPLE ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Historial Cost Convention

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Accounting Basis

The accounts have been prepared using a cash accounting basis. Where membership subscriptions remain unpaid at the due date, the member is treated as being unfinancial and the membership status is then reviewed by the committee.

Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Fixed assets are capitalised in the accounts and depreciation is charged to expenditure annually over the estimated life of the asset. Assets which are considered to have no further useful life are fully depreciated. Any assets which cost below \$100, purchased in the current year, have been fully expensed in the current year.

Income Tax

The company operates as a club. No provision is made for income tax liability as the directors believe the income of the company is excluded from assessment under the 'principle of mutuality' generally applied by the Australian Taxation Office.

2. INCORPORATION

The Victorian Sub Aqua Group was incorporated on 23rd January, 1964 as a company limited by guarantee. Licence was granted for the company to operate without the word 'Limited' in its name.

The main objects of the group are:

- to promote and further the sport of diving in Australia.
- to foster the interests of divers and users of diving apparatus.
- to seek to increase technical and scientific knowledge of all aspects of diving and encourage discussion on all matters and questions relating thereto.
- to co-operate in securing legislation and the formation of proper rules and regulations within Australia, governing the use of diving apparatus and advancing and protecting the interests of divers.

3. MANAGEMENT

The Articles of Association provide that the board of directors will be titled the "General Committee". The general committee consists of twelve honorary members who are elected by the general body of full members.

 - (a) the accompanying statement of income and expenditure is drawn up so as to give a true and fair view of the surplus of the company for the year ended 30th June, 1990;

Medicals can save your life

With your permission, a few words to Jon Mosen who wrote disapprovingly about the necessity of medicals for the over-50s. (Soundings, January).

Surely, Jon, you must know that physical ability begins to decline before the age of 53, and with it increased susceptibility to disease? Now is the time to take more care of yourself rather than less. Yes I'm sure you are perfectly fit and healthy and there is nothing to worry about—or is there?

I have always been strong and healthy, but when I started diving eighteen years ago (at your present age!), compulsory medical checks were not called for. Nevertheless I underwent them voluntarily and have done so each year since. With satisfying regularity I received glowing reports—"extremely fit", "blood pressure of a child", and so on.

Then in 1981 on my return from a strenuous safari/diving holiday in the Red Sea, my doctor noticed a "minor irregularity" in my heart beat. No problem, he said, but suggested I follow it up.

So after an overnight stay in Harefield Hospital for thorough testing, I complacently awaited the specialist's report.

"If you continue with your present active life style," he said, "I recken you have a 90% chance of a serious heart failure and possible death within the year." Surely there's some mistake, I thought, it can't be me he's talking about. I swim, I dive, I take regular exercise with no symptoms whatever of heart problems.

Well you pays your money and you takes the advice. Early in 1982 I had a quadruple coronary bypass operation—one artery was completely blocked and the others seriously obstructed. It was only my strong and healthy heart which had kept me going for so long.

Six months later, I returned to Stoney Cove for a shallow dive just to check for leaks. A couple of weeks later I went to the bottom to check both my physical and psychological reactions. Success! I was back to diving again.

Now in my 71st year I can look back on another strenuous year, 53 dives at all depths down to 50 metera and I'm still going strong—entirely due to regular medical examinations, and a recognition that as you get older you must take more care.

Jon, I wish you well in your future diving, but with no medicals will you be able to say the same at my age. Don't confuse "a grand oid age" with premature senility. Get those medicals done and stay with us. Set a good chairman's example to your club as I have done.

TO ALL MEMBERS OF V.S.A.G. RAMBLINGS FROM TURKEY

After about 30 hours flight we arrived at Constantinople (today's Istanbul) in Turkey. Eventually, after short passport and customs control we have been hit by Istanbul's traffic. It was a nightmare, I've driven in a lot of cities in many different countries but it was all child's play compared to Istanbul. They have a saying here which says that red lights are just a dark shade of green. Get in the wrong lane and you're stuck there for ages as you watch your destination go by and wonder how the hell you are going to get back there.

For many countries Constantinople was capital of the civilized world. The city is over 3000 years old in 330 A.D. the Roman Emperor Constantyn named it "New Rome" - capital of Roman Empire. It reached its height in the 1100's A.D. 1453 - Constantinople was conquered by the Turks and became capital of the Ottoman Turkish Empire. Without knowing something of its history, a tour of Istanbul's ancient monuments will leave you impressed but bewildered.

The Blue Mosque, Haghia Sophia and Topkapi Palace are three places which everyone should see before they die, it's a sin not to see them and the city as far as I'm concerned is the No. 1 in the world. Lots of books have been written about it and I've read a few, but this is a city you have to experience.

While we were there, we were walking down the street when we saw a sign which said that under the ground there was an ancient water cistern to see. We decided to have a look at it so we paid 50 cents and down we went. What a sight! This used to be the city's water supply built by the Romans. It has been drained so that you can go into it and it has a metre or so of water in it. There are 364 Roman columns holding up an enormous vaulted ceiling and the authorities have built walkways so that you can get around the place and they have illuminated the bottoms, of

two columns and the bases are sculpted into the heads of women. Probably some goddess who I've never heard of, but the point is that being under water for so long, they have escaped the ravages of time and vandals and they are still in perfect condition. There they are starring at you just as they appeared all those years ago without a blemish.

I've seen ancient Greek stuff and I've seen the temples in Mexico and Guatemala, but this is the first time I've seen something of this size completely undamaged for 2000 years and it's so good that the sculptor had even put one pimple on the nose. I read in a guide book that this cistern had been completely forgotten for centuries until a Swiss traveller in the XIX Century noticed that a man near where he was staying used to sell fresh fish every day outside his house and the traveller noticed that they were fresh water fish (Trout) so he asked the man where he got them and was told that they were caught through a hole in the cellar floor which of course turned out to be the cistern.

When I went to the toilet Julie was approached by a slick eleven year old postcard salesman who after losing the sale asked if she had any children. She said that - No, she didn't have any, he must have quickly put two and two together and thought to himself that I couldn't be much of a man because his next sales special was "you, me make sex, you have a baby" and he went on to boast that he had a further two already.

Topkapi Palace is astounding, in it's key day 5000 people lived in it and the jewellery collection, said to be the largest in the world and the most valuable. The various sultans (kings) had presents sent to them from all over the empire and other parts of the world. As you wander around the display you get so blase about it after a while. Oh, yee, look Julie, there's another one of those diamond encrusted daggers. No kidding it makes the crown jewels in the Tower of London look pretty insignificant. There was a hair from Mahommed's beard and one of his footprints cast in cement on some such substance and the paintings on the wall and ceilings are so intricate as to be indescribable. There was a Cafe there where you can sit with a cup of coffee overlooking the Bospharus and the Golden Horn and watch the ships and ferries go by. For me, I think it's the best place in the world to have a cuppa.

The Blue Mosque and Haghia Sophia - well I've run out of superlatives. West Minster Abbey, Notre Dame in Paris, Cologne Cathedral, eat your heart out. There just isn't anything in Europe to compare with these two places of worship, unless you go to Port Campbell in Victoria and see the wooden church by the wharf.

The grand bazaar is big, almost overwhelmingly huge - it's a great place. It's old, very old (about 500 years old). There are over four thousand shops in it. Have you ever seen a shopping centre with four thousand shops? There are banks and mosques inside it and the most gold jewellery we've ever seen, carpet stores, tea house, guys beating the shit out of bits of tin and copper and making kettles and things - you just have to see it. And it's done in the best possible style and taste.

I can go on about Istanbul for ages. It just seems incredible to me that everyone in the world hasn't been here, everywhere you turn there's history B.C. or A.D.★


