PRESIDENT'S REPORT 1998

VSAG - 43 Years

The VSAG Club continues to remain strong even as we see other private clubs are in decline. VSAG's main strength is in its social nature, which encompasses the whole family. As more members enter their middle years with growing families and other commitments, they still find time to come along to Club meetings and also support the various activities provided throughout the year.

This year has been the best that I can remember in the number of people not only attending the dives (those that weren't cancelled due to inclement weather), but also the general meetings held each month. The number of members and guests at each meeting has increased dramatically this year. An impressive line-up of guest speakers such as Pat Washington (President, VERFISH Vic), John Carrol (Port Philip Pilots), Des Williams (MAAV), and(Bicheno Dives), as well as Slide and video nights by Leo Maybus, John Ashley, Peter Vleugel and Des Williams have been a great draw-card, together with a great venue at Bells Hotel.

Club Membership has increased by 10%, with 7 new members joining VSAG this year. I would like to welcome all of them again on behalf of the Committee, and hope they will continue to support us with their attendance and input. The committee will continue its drive for new members bearing in mind the future viability of any club without young members to keep it going. It was interesting to note at the recent Sunken Assets 98 Seminar the number of divers in attendance and the average age of those divers. Where were the younger divers?

The Year has seen the VSAG Committee schedule some 58 events. These are 11 General Meetings, 31 day Dives, 7 Dive Trip/Weekends and 9 Social events. There were, however, 21 dives/weekends cancelled mainly due to bad weather (the El Nino effect rather than the El NoNo bothered effect) as can be seen by the attendances at other functions. A total of 853 persons attended VSAG functions, at an average of 23 per function. Not bad for a Club with 60 members on the books, 40% of who are in any way active.

Year's highlights:-

Last Christmas trip saw the largest contingent yet of VSAG members and their families (totaling 52) who spent a fun-filled and enjoyable 2 weeks at the SeaVu Caravan Park at Robe, South Australia. Don Abell's Annual Easter long weekend at Tidal River saw another record broken, with 82 members and visitors attending on 24 campsites. The diving seemed to take second place as members opted for only one day's diving and three of resting, or should I say socialising in the VSAG way!!

Pat Reynolds took 15 VSAGers and their wives on a diving holiday to the Philippines to discover some new wrecks. Bob Scott escorted 6 divers to King Island and back safely, and Des Williams chaperoned 5 divers on a return trip to Eaglehawk Neck for the Queens Birthday weekend.

Social functions held this year have been:

- * The annual Tennis Day, with more than 40 members and family and friends,
- * The annual Xmas function held at La Spaghettata in Lygon Street which was organised by Jerry, Leo and Robert and was well attended by over 50 members, partners and friends,
- * Sunday excursion to the Phillip Island Seal Display which was attended by approximately 25-30 members and their family and friends,
- * Sunken Assets '98 at RMIT at which VSAG had good attendance of around 17 members
- * Father's Day Yum Cha, organised by Gerry DeVries, and well attended by 36 People,
- * Weekend Snow trip to Mt. Hotham, organised by Leo Maybus, with 25 attendees.

On a more financial note, the Club funds (although in a reasonably healthy state) have been declining over the last few years since our Jeacle-inspired wine windfall, and some work is needed in putting together some fund-raising activities over the coming months into next year. The membership fees were

increased to \$55 (fees have not increased for several years), and have been increased this year to cover the ongoing printing, production and mailing costs of Fathoms, which as we all know is the life blood of the VSAG.

SDF has once again been in the trenches fighting on behalf of most divers, the proposed new Government legislation that yet again seeks to impose tighter catch limits on the diving fraternity. VSAG wholly supports the role the SDF plays, and on behalf of all divers and members of VSAG I wish to thank the SDF Committee once again for their efforts over the year. This year has seen the SDF Committee put on a great Seminar called "Sunken Assets 98" that was well attended by some 300 people.

It is with regret that we see two long-standing committee members standing down from committee duty to pursue other activities. I need not mention the esteem and high regard that Bob Scott and Des Williams are held in by all that know them. They have been the mainstays of the club for many years and I can't thank them both enough.

Finally, I would sincerely like to thank each and every Member of the VSAG Committee who have put in both their valuable time and considerable effort over the past 12 months in organising not only the diving, but also the social aspects that we have enjoyed over this past year.

A lot of patience and time goes into organising the dinners and excursions and trips that members enjoy. Often all the planning, headaches, worries, etc. that go into organising a successful function get put into the background and forgotten after the event. So I would like to thank those people who have put that time and effort in this year because without those tireless workers, then the Club would not be what it is today.

I would also like to say thank you for having me as President this past year - it has been an interesting and informative experience and I hope I have lived up to the expectations of the Members and of VSAG.

It also gives me great pleasure on behalf of the Committee to put forward a member nomination for a VSAG Life Membership. This nomination is put forward after considerable deliberation by the Committee. In 43 years VSAG

has only 9 life members. This nomination goes to someone who has been with the Club for nearly twenty years. Over this period he has worked tirelessly while on and off the Committee, with a dedication and commitment seldom seen or acknowledged these days. In his 20 years with the Club he has served in every role available from President to Editor, SDF Delegate and other roles. His commitment to VSAG and diving in general has been unparalleled. He will join the ranks of Life Members such as Tony Tipping, Bob Scott, John Goulding, Barry Truscott, to name but a few. I have much pleasure in nominating Des Williams to life membership.

Just a few more facts about Des Williams. He joined back in 1979 and was soon active on the Committee in the role of Editor. He single handedly made Fathoms what it is today. Back then he would produce the complete magazine - from typing the information on an old typewriter to hand-printing all the copies on a Gestetner machine - before posting them out. After 3 years as editor he took over the role of President for one year after that he was never far from the action doing several more stints as Editor. Even when not on the committee Des always had some input to the club. He was a founding member of the MAAV and is still active with Heritage Victoria Group now. He is also a long-standing VSAG delegate and Committee member of the Scuba Divers Federation of Victoria.

Over the years Des's propensity to scribble has produced something in the order of 261 articles for Fathoms, a fact alone that makes his input unsurpassed. That's 2 articles per issue on average. In recent years he has done a magnificent PR job of looking after and making welcome the many guests and newcomers to VSAG.

His attention to detail leaves nothing to chance as many will attest to having enjoyed the overseas trips and other events Des has organised. Who can forget the Jack Loney talks? Des' intimate knowledge of the diving industry and the people in it is well known and his mentoring will be sorely missed by the committee.



THE SPECULANT 1895 - 1911



The Speculant was a fine looking sailing ship and was typical of the coastal traders of the day, of sail that is. You see, by the early 1900's to see a sailing ship was becoming rare and for every ship of sail there were ten steamships.

The days of sail were numbered as steamships were able to be on time and in most cases required less crew to operate the vessel.




The Speculant operated mainly in Australian waters carrying general cargo of all types. She not only worked out of large ports such as Sydney and Melbourne, but was a regular visitor to ports such as Portland. It was in fact on a return voyage from Portland to Melbourne when she ran aground at Cape Patten in a thick fog and was totally wrecked, but luckily no lives were lost and she was in ballast at the time.



For those VSAG members who know the Great Ocean Road, especially at Cape Patten, will understand why the Speculant will never appear on our dive calendar, and besides when the Great Ocean Road was widened during the 1920's most of the wreck site was covered with rocks. However, some anchors have been raised over the years and one is mounted at the Apollo Bay foreshore.

For the serious wreck diver there are still some parts of the ship that can be identified close inshore, but the exact location is hard to find and my memory is starting to fade with age.



Within one year of the vessel going ashore it was reduced to a bow section lying on the rocks, very similar in fact to the remains of the "Speke" on Phillip Island. Don't go looking for the remains of the bow section as it's under tons of rocks.

EDEN TUGS

On Friday 18th September 1998, I journeyed over to Eden N.S.W arriving at 7PM, for a couple of days diving on the scuttled ocean tugboats.

I travelled over with John Allen, with whom I have been diving lately in the old hard-hat gear, and we met up with two of his friends Rachel Brennan and Peter Stewart-Smith, making our diving group four. We stayed in the Twofold Dive Centre Dive Lodge, which was very comfortable indeed. We had the whole place to ourselves.

Saturday morning produced on-shore winds, which meant that diving the tugs was out of the question. Much disappointment! We motored across Twofold Bay to the north shore, where we dropped into filthy water and the usual bare rock territory with urchins and the odd blue grouper, so characteristic of N.S.W diving. Very boring and with some icy water dribbling into my drysuit, I exited after only five minutes. The others continued the dive without me. The leak in the suit turned out to be due to an improper seal of the collar, caught in my warm iwooley bearî garment, so I will be more careful next time.

The rest of Saturday, we rested and watched videos of some of our recent hardhat dives and John showed one on the dive he made on the tug Tasman Hauler, at Eden, in full standard dress heavy gear, last year. So, our appetites were well and truly whetted for a dive on the wreck the next day. Had a great meal at the Australasian Hotel that evening, with dive operator Peter Hall and his wife Lorna. Peter's dive boat is a large shark-cat, which is very comfortable and he had plenty of dive and whale-watching stories for us that evening.

Eden is now a very big whale watching centre, as the once almost extinct mammoths have again returned to the place, where they were slaughtered in great numbers. The township of Eden now derives many tourist dollars from whalewatching and Peter quite often encounters them whilst out diving.
