

President's Report

recently received some feedback from one of our club meeting guest speakers complimenting us for what a vibrant and friendly club that VSAG was. The truth of this comment struck me as I reflected back on the last 12 months ahead of the AGM. We have achieved so much and continue to be a very active club full of fantastic people.

Our membership has continued to grow slowly across the year with 12 new members joining while the vast majority of members have renewed their membership for this year. Our finances are very healthy and this has enabled us to invest this year.

One of the most important objectives for the club this year was to increase our focus on



safety and we have been busy in that area. Early in the diving year we ran a very successful boat skippers' day where we relaunched our skippers pack and collectively discussed in detail, the safe execution of our boating and diving operations. We invested in this area with the upgrading of our O2 kits giving us the ability to keep multiple divers on O2 for extended times, should that ever be necessary. We also invested in training to increase the capability ofour membership to utilise the O2 and also to give first aid. In all, 24 members took advantage of the subsidised training courses

that we offered. Finally, we revised and reissued our diving guidelines making important, if minor changes. The focus on safety has paid off and this year has been largely issue free for the club with our only notable incident coming back on land where one member was taken ill post diving. The boat crew of John Gladding, Greg Richards and Benita McDonough dealt with incident superbly and the member concerned has since made a full recovery.

Thanks to the continued hard work of Peter Galvin and David Flew, we successfully completed our transition to an Incorp-orated Association. This has brought our constitution and rules up to date and made the administration of the club much easier.

We also completed another long running project and published the 60th Anniversary book. We were pleased that the finances allowed us to provide members with a free copy. An awful lot of hard work went into producing the book and I'm sure that you will agree with me that the end result was superb. Congratulations again to Lloyd Borrett. John Lawler, Williams, Don Abel and Paul Tipping. Our club prides itself on it publications and Cheryl Lees has continued to do a fantastic job as editor of Fathoms. The quality of the magazine has once again been something of which we can rightly be proud. After several years in the role of editor Cheryl has decided to step down from the role next year. Christine Reynolds was quick to step into the role and I'm sure Fathoms will go from strength strength under her to stewardship.

After the success of our local diving activities last year, this year has been just as active with diving on nearly every weekend but has generally seen less people joining the dives. If I have any concerns with the health of our club then this is the area. As a committee we have discussed how we

encourage more people to dive regularly with the club and will continue to try and offer the sort of diving that membership would like. That said, two events stand out with both the opening up of the City of Launceston wreck and the out at Cody Banks attracting enormous interest. We would love to have your suggestions in this area.

After several years break the club organised an overseas diving trip that was well supported. Those that made the trip to South Africa Mozambique had a fantastic time and we all came back a bit more confident in our diving skills, more practised in surf launching and honed our ability to stay in the boat in large swells and during high speed runs back onto the beach. We also made a return trip to Tassie for three days of excellent diving at Eaglehawk Neck. The travel side of the club looks very healthy with a booked out trip to Sydney coming up and

Tassie and Vanuatu trips already planned for 2017.

If the local club diving had eased off, that certainly wasn't the case with the social side of the club. We were grateful to Lloyd and Cheryl for once again hosting the Christmas party and the Life Members came together for their annual dinner. We also had a very successful overnight sailing trip on the Enterprize tall ship and a very well attended Christmas in July event. **Perhaps** the highlight of the year from my perspective, was the family boating day on the Yarra with a BBQ on Herring Island. We had a very good day and it made a nice change to point the boats away from the ocean.

Another pleasing aspect of the year has been the monthly club meetings. Last year this was an area of concern for us with attendances dwindling and a change of venue. This year we have had some really excellent guest speakers and our investment in a projector has improved the audiovisuals. The

number of members attending has grown steadily and on more than one occasion we have had to scramble to get more chairs out. I will long remember the June meeting where we had 54 people in attendance.

As a club our reputation seems to be strong and our Facebook pages are helping to spread the word about the club. The Facebook group has continued to grow and we now have 269 people in the group up from 200 at this point last year. Although we had plans to revamp the website last year we

didn't make the progress we would have liked for one good reason or another. This is an area where we will continue to focus.

Finally, I would like to thank the committee for their passion, commitment, ideas and all the hard work over the last 12 months. Without this group the club would not function and we are lucky to have such a group. I am looking forward to the club going from strength to strength again next year.





MORE FIVE-WAY BEASTS

The Phylum Echinodermata has other members – echinoids (sea urchins) ophiuroids (brittle stars) and holothurians (sea slugs or beche-de-mer).

ECHINOIDS

Some are globular or spherical in shape while others have become pushed out of alignment by adaptations but all are related in having the basic five-rayed symmetry. There are two basic echinoid shapes – the regular echinoids which have globose shells (tests) and the irregular echinoids in which the basic test symmetry is bilateral.

REGULAR ECHINOIDS

We always see them on dives. The test is composed of a fragile layer of calcium carbonate covered by a keratin sheath to which spines of various lengths are attached, and perforated by holes through which tube feet protrude. The spines are composed of crystalline layers of calcium carbonate and aragonite and are attached to the test by a ball and socket system to allow free movement. The tube feet are much longer and more slender than those of the seastars and must project beyond the spines to assist movement. They are usually withdrawn in daylight but extend at night. The basic symmetry of the test is usually in multiples of five which is often obscured by the sheath covering the test. The mouth is central on the underside and is armed with a system of very sharp interlocking teeth (called Aristotle's Lantern – don't ask me why!) arranged in a circular drill bit pattern for scraping and grinding food.

Heliocidaris erthyrogramma

This commonest sea urchin in the bay has a test completely covered in long spines. Colours are highly very variable from pink, mauve and red, the spines are often being a different colour to the test. Although not poisonous the microscopic texture of broken spines makes them very hard to remove and if you kneel on an urchin. Embedded spines can remain as an irritant for months until they work their way out.

Heliocidaris is an opportunistic and voracious scavenger with populations often arriving in waves, eating everything in sight except for a few unpalatable sponges. It can be found anywhere on seagrass beds to reef. At Steele Rock near Portarlington the marine community is still slowly recovering from an invasion about six years ago.

A moderately successful fishery harvests the urchin but the roe inside the test is not particularly abundant and occurs only at certain times of the year.

Holopneustes ovatum

Smaller and more spherical than Heliocidaris, with short spines and duller colour. Grazes on algae and lives among seagrasses. Dead tests are sometimes washed ashore. Common in the bay but not seen as often as Heliocidaris.

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Goniocidaris tubaria

A large echinoid not often seen unless you dive in Western Port where it lives among and near seagrass beds. The relatively few spines are long and thick, hence the name "pencil urchin". Spines are often thorny and overgrown with small algae and invertebrates. The vulnerable bases of the spines are protected by a sheath of smaller finger-like spines. Grazes on small invertebrates

IRREGULAR ECHINOIDS

Burrowers are seldom seen by divers – unless you go looking. As a globular test is no use for a life ploughing through sediments these urchins have evolved bilateral symmetry with a front (anterior) end and back (posterior) end. Nor is it any use having long stiff spines which would impede progress so they are reduced to furry backward-facing spikes. Irregular echinoids feed by ingesting organic material in soft sediments.

Echinocardium cordatum

A small delicate species sometime called "sea mouse" burrowing shallowly in muddy seabed. Although it is very common in bay muds (up to $10/m^2$) because we don't usually dive there or look closely it is seldom seen. These echinoids have a long fossil history, and an ancestral species (*Lovenia woodsi*) of Miocene Age (30 m years) is often washed up on Beaumaris beaches.





Diving the Hurricane 27 August 2016

The weather forecast and the actual weather were a million miles apart today. Two boats headed out to dive the the Hurricane with forecasts for 10-15 Knot North Westerlies. By the time we had finished diving we were faced with 25-30 Knot winds and a very bumpy run back to Rye. We then had to man handle the boats back onto the trailers at the ramp with the wind coming directly onto the ramp.

With the conditions as they were, we only did one dive and underneath the conditions were excellent. The variety of life on show was fantastic as usual for the Hurricane. It's a dive I always enjoy.

The Hurricane

WRECK OF THE SHIP HURRICANE IN PORT PHILLIP BAY.

Reported in The Mercury newspaper April 27, 1869

"(From the Melbourne Daily Telegraph.)

Considerable excitement was manifested in the city, yesterday morning, upon the reception of telegraph intelligence that the ship Hurricane, Captain Johnstone (late of the Lightning), which had arrived safely from Liverpool, was foundering inside the Heads.

......The fact was, to say the least of it, astonishing, that she should so soon and without the least apparent warning, be in distress. The Titan steam-tug was sent to her assistance, and made for the vessel. But now we must go back and observe the scene on board of the vessel. As we have before stated, she was coming along prosperously, and it is said " grazed" on the port quarter near Point Lonsdale, but the action was so slight very little notice was taken of the circumstance, and then she still proceeded very rapidly through the Pilot Kennedy water. was command, and one of the seamen said, " Sir, the water is coming in very rapidly through the hawse holes, and

as usual in this ship, our clothes and all our traps are being saturated with water."

The place was examined, and it was seen that a volume of water, as described by an eye-witness, almost as thick as a man's thigh, was coming in with the force of an immense cataract. The startling fact was apparent that the vessel was in imminent danger of foundering. Captain Johnstone and Pilot Kennedy did all in their power, from what we can learn of the circumstances, save Hurricanetwo boats were got although great excitement prevailed, the women were placed in them and afterwards the men. An effort was made to got the long boat out, but it proved abortive, as the prow of the ship was going down the sea was rushing over the decks, and the stern of the boat was stove in against the mainmast.The sails had been furled, but the sailors kept manfully to the ship, the poor fellows swimming about the decks

even up to the vessel's sinking, and then taking to the rigging. The bow of the vessel, we are informed, settled down fully three- quarters of an hour before the stern-post kissed the water's edge, and then the fine old ship went quietly and straightly down in six fathoms, and even at the time she had sunk it was flood tide. It is stated that a man could stand on the deck and the water would have only been breast high, so that it is probable at low water the rail of the decks would not be very much under water.

Captain Johnstone and Pilot Kennedy were the last to leave the wreck......The Titan, from Queenscliff, was the first steam-tug to put in an appearance, and the passengers were taken on board.

Pilot Kennedy states he has been eighteen years in the service, and the

present accident is the first one he has met with, and now he cannot account for the sinking of the vessel, without it is that the water came in through the hawse-holes. The Hurricane is an iron ship, built in Glasgow, by Alexander Stephens, in 1853, and made during her early career a voyage from England to Sydney in a little over seventy days. If there is anything in the rumour that she received injury from the " grazing," it is confidently asserted, in contravention of the statement which appeared in a contemporary that she struck the "Lightning Rock," that Captain Johnstone commanded the Lightning at the time this rock was discovered, and it is scarcely possible that he did not know its whereabouts. In fact, it is not near the track the ship took.

CAPTAIN JOHNSTONE'S STATEMENT.

Captain Johnstone states:—The Hurricane, D. H. Johnstone, left Liverpool on the 12th of January, and had strong S.W. winds for twenty- one days, by which time we had only reached Madeira. The N.E. trades were very light, and the ship did not cross the equator until the thirty-ninth day out; after that light winds prevailed. The meridian of the Cape was not reached until the seventy-second day. Since then up to Cape Otway, which was made at noon on the 20th inst., the weather was fine, and the ship made good runs. The pilot was

taken on board at 6 p.m. on the 21st. The ship entered the Heads at 8 a.m. on the following morning. On passing Point Lonsdale it was felt that the ship twice grazed the bottom but so slightly that very little notice was taken of it. The pumps were sounded, and no water was found in the ship. Shortly after, on passing through the South Channel, it was perceived that the ship was settling by the head. The forehold was again sounded, and 6ft. of water was found in it. Both Capt. Johnstone and the pilot thought that by shortening sail and anchoring, the hold would be freed from water, as the water was coming through the hawse pipes. This was done, and in a few minutes the ship went down by the head, only leaving scant time for the crew and passengers getting into the boats: the vessel sank in 32ft. of water. Both passengers and crew lost the whole of their effects, as the two remaining boats were quite filled with passengers and crew, forty-six in all. The long boat was stove by the heavy sea washing along the docks. It was seen from the Heads that there was something wrong with the ship, and the Titan steamtug was at once sent from Queenscliff with Customs boat in tow, under charge of Mr. Keene. Having embarked the passengers and crew, the tug left the scene of the wreck, and arrived at Sandridge at 8 o'clock.The ship is now lying in Capel Sound in a perfectly upright position, with seven

feet of water above the deck. Messrs. Norton and Graham's tug-steamers Hercules and Challenge came down the Bay in the afternoon, having Mr. Dickson (of Dickson, Williams, and Co.,) the agent of the vessel, on board. Captain Johnston speaks in very glowing terms of the conduct of the passengers under the very trying circumstances in which they were placed. The Challenge is still alongside of the vessel, and the chief officer has been left in charge of the wreck. The Titan put into Schnapper Point, and provisions were procured for the passengers. �


