






Tutupo Island Reefs



President Coolidge Cargo Holds 1&2

The first dives today were our first penetration dives. The group split into 3 and we all headed to separate spots. Myself, guide Alfred and Paul Williams headed to Cargo holds 1 & For both safety and good photographs inside wrecks careful finning is required and both Alfred and Paul did an excellent job. Inside hold one we found several Willeys jeeps originally packed in crates that have now rotted away. In hold two were the larger 10 wheel GM Trucks and 155mm Long Tom gun barrels. We also ducked into the barber's shop to photograph the barber's chair and visited the crew's mess where many artefacts are still to be seen. -Ian Scholey









A double dive on the SS President Coolidge today with our 3 buddy pairs heading off in different directions. Myself and Paul Williams started with a good look through the very impressive engine room. Huge boilers, twin engines, some nice gauges and 4 telegraphs were the highlights. Our second dive involved some tight squeezes as meandered through the guts of the ship exiting through the chain locker. We found lots of artefacts on the way including light fittings with the bulbs still in place, rifles, gas masks, entrenching tools, water bottles, a typewriter in one of the offices, a

vice in the forward workshop and mirrors along with the other fittings in the bathrooms. As usual we all hooked back up at the Deco Stop.





In the afternoon we did a dive on a Douglas Dauntless dive bomber which doesn't much resemble a plane anymore but a slow drift along the channel wall brought lots of other surprises. Today first up was a great dive on the Henry Bonnard an inter island ferry sitting in 42m of water on a sandy bottom. Sitting bolt upright and being only 40 metres long, the whole ship is diveable and the 35m viz made this one of my best dives here so far. After lunch we were treated to a great reef dive off Bokissa Island and after having a break headed out for a night dive on the Coolidge.





TUNICATES - THE SEA SQUIRTS

The Tunicates are a large and diverse group of marine invertebrates that we often see but usually don't recognise. There are many species in Australia ranging from the tropics to temperate regions. Unfortunately, there is noone in Australia currently researching this interesting group of organisms.

Almost all tunicates have an outer membrane of cellulose-like "tunicin", hence their They name. predominantly sessile filter feeders complex and advanced biology. The animal has two siphons - an incurrent one for drawing in water and an excurrent siphon for expelling waste. Thev are colloquially called sea squirts because when disturbed, water is forcibly ejected as the siphons close. They have a complex nervous, circulatory and digestive system. They are very distantly related to vertebrates (ourselves) as the larva has a notochord like that of human embryos. After finding a suitable habitat the free swimming tadpolelike larva sticks head down and both head and tail are resorbed as the adult begins to grow. Due to their tough outer skin (test) they have few

predators although some nudibranchs specialise in feeding on them.

The tunicates we normally the sessile Class belong to Ascidiacea found on firm substrate in many habitats. Some are strongly adherent to the substrate, others are stalked and put down some anchoring roots

Another group of tunicates that we see only rarely are the salps, long trailing ribbons of jelly-like clusters of individuals floating in the summer plankton.

The three major groups of sessile ascidians that are familiar to us are: the solitary, colonial and compound groups.

SOLITARY ASCIDIANS. These are the large ones we often see on dives. The in/excurrent siphons are large and quickly close when the animal is disturbed.

Pyura stolonifera

A ubiquitous ascidian hand-sized or larger, growing solitary or in groups on jetty piles, reef and sometimes on the seabed. It is a very versatile species, able to fix itself to whatever

substrate is available. The test varies in colour from pinkish to yellowishbrown and the large siphons are in the form of a cross with a sensitive outer fringe. The leathery test is often an attractive substrate for settlement of algae and other invertebrates. They occur throughout the bay and on local ocean coasts but prefer quieter waters.

I'm not aware that any studies have been done to determine the life history of P. stolonifera but I once found a colony on Gem pier in Williamstown plugged onto clean wood of a pile that had been installed 14 years previously!

Herdmania grandis

Another common large ascidian which prefers oceanic or nearoceanic reef habitats and jetty piles. The body texture is very firm and jelly-like, the large siphons are smooth and trumpet-shaped, usually in shades of pink with a darker line around the rim. It can reverse blood circulation around the body and has peculiar ability to the secrete vanadium from seawater using it in the same way as haemoglobin in our blood. Many years ago I collected some specimens for bleeding the blood for estimation clear vanadium in the blood; it was a tug-o

-war to get them intact off the substrate.

STALKED ASCIDIANS

There are several local species that have solved the problem of getting above the substrate, and therefore have access to better feeding opportunities. Their flexible stalks are so tough that it is almost impossible to pull them away from the substrate. Most of these species prefer oceanic near-oceanic or habitat, although occasionally one can be found on bay jetties.

Pyura spinifera

ascidian of deeper oceanic waters. It grows in clusters of knobbly stalked individuals. Varies in colour from yellow to pink with a slippery texture from a thin epibiotic sponge covering the test. Common along southern coasts.



individuals These are smaller clustered together in sheets feeding and protection. They are often seen in extensive mats. Each individual has an in/excurrent siphon. They are found in all habitats but easily seen (if we look carefully) on jetty piles and reef in places of good water movement. Depending upon species they come in many colours and are often partly disguised by sand embedded in the test.

Amphicarpa diptycha

Colonies of small closely associated individuals. the test is only moderately tough, and usually shades of brown in colour. The in/excurrent siphons are clearly seen. It can withstand high water turbidity

Clavellina australis

White to pale blue or pink, small hand-sized untidy clusters. Prefers sheltered oceanic reef habitat Individuals are easy to see as the siphons are bright blue, contrasting with the pale translucent jelly-like test. There are several related similar species with varying colours and general appearance.

Genus and species unknown.....

Not being my speciality I do not to attempt to identify this species. It has a moderately tough jelly-like texture and favours a quiet water habitat. The in/ex current siphons indicate it is a colonial species, but it may be a compound species. Can anyone help? There is so much we don't know even of common marine invertebrate species.

Rock Lobster Tagging Program


Tagging of recreationally caught rock lobsters commenced on 1 July 2017

A primary focus for the government is to ensure ongoing access to the rock lobster resource for all sectors, and a healthy, sustainable and well-managed fishery for present and future generations to enjoy.

JUNE GUEST SPEAKER

VSAG General Meeting **Guest Speaker** Kade Mills 20 June 2017

Kade, as a scientist, has elected to work for Victorian National Parks Association, working with Marine department. VNPA is a not for profit organisation and has been around for 65 years. Currently there is a staff of 12 working in the organisation including Kade. The organisation is involved identifying areas which require protection and was involved in the protection of Wilsons Prom, when there was an attempt commercialise the Prom.

Reef Watch has been around for 15 vears, and has worked on the project to protect and create shellfish reefs with one of VSAG's previous guest speakers, Simon Branigan. Kade discussed that at one time Melbourne had 60 Oyster saloons selling quality great Melbourne oysters.



The oyster program, after putting down sediment plates, takes seeded oysters from a farm and re-locates them. Experiments are also being conducted to establish if the structures will make a natural place for the oysters to grow without seeding on a farm first. The types of oysters they are growing is Paper Oysters and the oysters will be released on the sediment plates in October when they release their larva

One of the areas Kade would like to work is on analysing the data



obtained from the Fish Count and making a story from this data. Kade also discussed the fact that members from the rays and sharks family that are seen very regularly at Point Cook have been added to the list of species that will be included in the Fish Count for next year.

Another area that Kade is getting involved in is using technology similar to facial recognition with the dots on the weedy sea dragons to build up a database of the dragons and monitor them. At some point in the future Kade will be asking if photos of sea dragons can be sent to him for this purpose. He did note that he is not ready for these as yet so please don't send them.

Kade left us with the possibility of the club potentially getting involved and collecting data with reef live surveys to assist the scientists.

A very interesting talk which was enjoyed by the VSAG members.



Blairgowrie Marina blown out by 30k N/NNW winds boat or shore diving wasn't an option for the bay so we met at Flinders Pier for an early (8am) dive. Bo Zhang & I went out for a leisurely Tuesday double dive on the Hurricane as the wind forecast was for 5-10k winds for most of the day & a slack water time of approx. 10:18am. Once anchored we geared up, performed buddy checks & entered the water at approx. 9:45am into a 2 knot (approximate) outgoing current.

Once on the bottom we ran a line from the anchor & swam to the stern section then the bow area & had a good look around. We saw the usual leather jackets, ornate cow fish, rockling, pinkies plus a draft board shark tucked away under section. After 35 minutes we ascended, completed our safety stop then climbed back onboard to have morning tea & change tanks.

For the second dive, I had a good look around the middle, bow section for cuttle fish or any eggs but didn't see any. After 30 minutes & with the tide now running in at about 2 knots we returned to the anchor, completed our safety stop then climbed back onboard. With the

gear packed away we recovered the anchor & headed back to the ramp.


June 11 2017

Conditions outside were good so after an easy run through the heads in choppy seas we dived first on the J5. After looking at the corrosion around the conning tower, it's obvious that it won't be long before it's on the sand. A great dive in 15 metre viz with all the usual fish life. After lunch we did our 2nd dive on the Coogee in much the same viz. Most of the fish seem to live around the stern on this wreck and I was told even the odd cray. Back at the boat ramp both boats were boarded and checked by Fisheries.



BOAT RAMP PERMITS—MORNINGTON PENINSULA SHIRE COUNCIL

Annual Boat Ramp Permits are valid for a 12 month period from 01 November to 31 October. The annual permit fee is \$125.00 (GST free).

The permit comes in the form of a vehicle windscreen sticker that **must** be attached to the bottom left hand side of the vehicle windscreen. To purchase an annual boat ramp permit complete the application form or visit one of our Customer Service Centres during business hours 8.30am – 5pm Monday to Friday (excluding Public Holidays).

You must pay a fee for each day that you use and park at a Shire boat ramp.

This has been made easy with the introduction of cashless parking meters at boat ramps across the peninsula.

Set up an account online with Parkmobile by visiting www.parkmobile.com.au call 1300 564 564 or download the free smart device application at iTunes, Google Play or Windows markets. You will be guided to register your vehicle (car) registration number and your credit card details.

Parking vouchers

Users who do not have a credit card, or who are infrequent users of the ramps, can pre-purchase vouchers (\$12) from any of the Shire's customer service centres during business hours. The vouchers are 'one use' only and do not have an expiry date; therefore, you can buy a few and use them when you want. Just complete the details on the voucher and display on your dashboard. ❖

Please see the flyers for both the Truk trip and the optional extension.




