

Financial Controls

Expenditure





ALFRED HOSPITAL HYPERBARIC

We had a very interesting night at the Alfred Hospital's Hyperbaric Chamber tour and divers information evening. Lots of VSAG members in attendance along with others from the diving community. Attending from VSAG were Ian Scholey, Peter Carole Campisano, Arthur Mark Jeffrey, Kokkinos. Priya Cardinaletti, John Mills and PT Hirshfield.

The key messages from the night were:

- anyone can get bent
- it's nothing to be ashamed of as most incidents involve no breaking of diving protocols
- getting bent doesn't usually prevent future diving
- getting bent does not increase your chances of getting bent in the future
- presenting to the hospital early plays a big part in successful recovery
- reducing ascent rates due to computer use has significantly reduced incidents from about 200 a year to 20 a year

The night also included some very interesting and entertaining stories from Hyperbaric Doctor and Diver Dr Andrew Fook. It has to be said that some divers really don't help themselves especially when it comes to denial that they have a problem. If in doubt, get straight on the O2 and get to the hospital. If the chance comes up again and you haven't attended one of these evenings it's well worth getting there.







Des shared his extensive historical knowledge and gave a talk entitled, "The exploits of Diver Johnstone and RMS Niagara salvage - 1941".

The presentation included summary of the life of famous Australian salvage diver John "Johnno" Johnstone who was quite a character and had a remarkable and long diving career. Johnstone even made a personal appearance as a speaker at a VSAG meeting back in 1957, which is still remembered by older VSAG members!


Des presented details of the famous story of the sinking of the gold ship

RMS NIAGARA close to Auckland Harbour in 1940. The ship was sailing for Canada with eight tonnes of gold on board, when it struck a German mine, laid by the audacious German raider ORION and sank in 140M of water in the Hauraki Gulf.

Des linked the past with the present in his presentation on the ship, the German raider, subsequent epic gold salvage ventures and the modern day tech-diver exploration of the wreck.




John Edward 'Johnno' Johnstone (1892-1976)

The initial 1940 search for the wreck over a wide area in the Hauraki Gulf. was conducted by Melbourne salvage expert Capt. J. P. Williams, who refurbished a derelict old steamer which CLAYMORE, had been abandoned on the Auckland mud banks for years. The story of this very low budget, epic salvage success, contained all the excitement of a good old fashioned pirate adventure.

Des also included in the presentation a life history of the exploits of the famous Melbourne salvage diver John "Johnno" Johnstone. Johnstone spent a life-time salvage diving around Australia and the Pacific, between 1920 and 1965 and was the

leading salvage diver on the NIAGARA gold recovery ventures in both 1940 and 1953 &

GEORGE KERMODE

The George Kermode

I thought that Vsager's may be interested in this excellent set of images from the scuttling of the George Kermode. These were taken by life member Des Williams.

As you can imagine there was great interest in the scuttling around the club at the time and it didn't take VSAG divers long to go down and dive her. Des reports that the name of the vessel was still visible.

Those that have dived the wreck recently will know that she is rapidly breaking up now. It is still a fantastic dive though, with some good penetration possible.


She was built in 1914 by Fleming and Ferguson in Paisley Scotland as

the Sir William Matthews. She was a twin screwed steam bucket dredge with an overall length of 230ft, a beam of 44ft and a draught of 17ft giving her a displacement of 803 tons. She was purchased by Melbourne Harbour trust on October, 1941. After an extensive refit she was renamed the George Kermode and was used to maintain the Port of Melbourne. She was scuttled by the Department Conservation, Forests and Land on the 1 April, 1976 (April Fools Day) as an artificial reef in Cunningham Bay off Phillip Island. She now lies upside down in 20 meters of water rising up to 12 meters at the highest point.

MORE ASCIDIANS

Last time we have looked at solitary and some colonial ascidians and now we check on more colonial as well as ascidians. compound Compound ascidians are a group in which the zooids (individual polyps) embedded in a matrix. They work in harmony and have a common internal system with and inexcurrent apertures open to the water. Usually the zooids are tiny and crowded in the matrix which may be sheet-like and leathery or upright and spreading.

Although often brightly coloured like colonial and compound sponges, ascidians can easily be distinguished from sponges by touch – they have a firm jelly-like texture compared with the softer squeezy texture of sponges. Some ascidians also have calcareous spicules giving them a firm harsh texture, but the texture of most is firm jelly-like and slippery.

Ascidians are known from intertidal zone to the deepest ocean abyss. Diversity in Southern Australia is the highest in the world. Ascidians have a long evolutionary history, sharing with us our most primitive embryonic stages of a notochord, before development of vertebrae. The swimming larva looks rather like a

tadpole, finds a suitable substrate where it fixes its head, the tail curls around and proceeds to grow into a new colony.


They are a difficult and complex group to work with and some we have often see never been scientifically described. For expert ascidian identification an taxonomist undertakes microscopic examination of anatomy of the zooids and spicules for identification of species. Unfortunately there is no ascidian expert working in Australia today. And as you will see from the following I have little expertise in ascidian taxonomy and often cannot identify colonies to species or even to genus.

Most compound ascidians have distinctive colour patterns and precise arrangement patterns of individual zooids. However as colour often varies between colonies, it is not a reliable basis to attempt recognition.,

Spreading colonies.

Many species grow in spreading, often tough thin sheets over rock and jetty piles. The sheets can usually be pulled off by hand. Didemnum patulum is a very common ascidian

at Crawfish Rock in Western Port, where it grows in large tough sheets in visibility Another poor water. spreading colony is either Leptoclinides exiguous or Tridemnum sibogae, (I don't know which) which has a thin slippery jelly-like texture; it is common on bay jetty piles.

Sponge Look-alikes.

Another common species that favours quiet water habitat and looks like a peach-coloured sponge is *Didemnum* delectum (again, I'm not sure of its correct identity). Often seen shallow sheltered bay reefs, clusters look very like a sponge. The soft jelly-like texture gives it away as an ascidian.

Massive colonies.

Botrylloides leachii Is a common locally abundant compound ascidian, usually with large spreading colonies and spectacular but variable colours. It favours quiet water habitats, often jetty piles or on shallow reef. The looped patterns of the excurrent siphons around the larger incurrent siphon is diagnostic of the species.

Two common colour variants are shown below.



Botrylloides leachii, Yellow colony, Clifton Springs jetty ruins, 1m. Mauve colony, reef in Corio Bay, 4 m.



Botrylloides anceps grows in a thick finger-like clusters of several colonies united at the base. Colour is very variable, ranging from cream through to reddish-brown. Each colony has a wide apical opening and the rows of small dots along the sides are zooid openings. Very abundant on local reefs and jetty piles in good water movement.

Stalked Ascidians

We sometime see stalked ascidians on sandy bottom. The tough flexible stalks raise the colony above the substrate to provide better feeding opportunities. There are several local species, some are orange in shallow water and others of different colours in deeper waters.

Unknown Ascidian

Judging by the firm jelly-like texture and tiny yellow zooids it is definitely compound ascidian, possibly Botrylloides but I really have no idea of its identity. Has anyone seen it anywhere else? There is so much we don't know and so few experts to help!



EL CONDESITO

TENERIFE, **CANARY ISLANDS**

30-metre-long The boat 'El Condesito' ran aground off the coast of the southern most tip of the island of Tenerife in 1971. The wreck of the 'El Condesito' is one of the most unique diving spots in Tenerife. The wreck, split up into several parts, is at the bottom of an undersea canyon 20 metres deep, flanked by walls with prismatic formations and rich with abundant marine life.

The anchor point of the boat is 3.7 nautical miles away from the port of the large tourist resort of Los Cristianos. The wreck is home to numerous octopus, cuttlefish and parrotfish. The dive usually involves passing through the surrounding rocks with their spectacular prismatic formations.

Save the Rays



Victorian Fisheries Authority has installed signs to remind people to respect rays and skates in the coming months! You might spot the signs next to boat ramps and piers around Port Phillip.

lf fishing and vou are unintentionally catch a ray or skate, return it to the water as soon as possible without injury or suffering. Ideally, keep it in the water to gently remove the hook or cut the line as close to the hook as possible. If you

catch a barbed ray, minimise handling and do your best to stay safe. Don't place rays on hot dry surfaces and use wet hands or wet towels to assist.

If you love rays and skates like we do, then let's work together and give them the respect they deserve!

Tagging of recreationally caught rock lobsters commenced on 1 July 2017


From 1 July 2017, all recreational fishers will be required to tag the rock lobster they catch and keep as part of a three year trial program.

BOAT RAMP PERMITS—MORNINGTON PENINSULA SHIRE COUNCIL

Annual Boat Ramp Permits are valid for a 12 month period from 01 November to 31 October. The annual permit fee is \$130.00 (GST free).

The permit comes in the form of a vehicle windscreen sticker that must be attached to the bottom left hand side of the vehicle windscreen. To purchase an annual boat ramp permit complete the application form or visit one of our Customer Service Centres during business hours 8.30am – 5pm Monday to Friday (excluding Public Holidays).

You must pay a fee for each day that you use and park at a Shire boat ramp.

This has been made easy with the introduction of cashless parking meters at boat ramps across the peninsula.

Set up an account online with Parkmobile by visiting www.parkmobile.com.au call 1300 564 564 or download the free smart device application at iTunes, Google Play or Windows markets. You will be guided to register your vehicle (car) registration number and your credit card details.

Parking vouchers

Users who do not have a credit card, or who are infrequent users of the ramps, can pre-purchase vouchers (\$12) from any of the Shire's customer service centres during business hours. The vouchers are 'one use' only and do not have an expiry date; therefore, you can buy a few and use them when you want. Just complete the details on the voucher and display on your dashboard. ❖


